## \$300. is Branch's Pledge for Veterans in Commonwealth

Although Georgetown's taxes went up 4.43 mills last week, and the provincial government's budget had yet to be brought down, these facts did not deter the ever faithful few who were on hand at Thursday general meeting.

David Capperault, Ontario Command 3rd vice president, reminded the membership of the 'British Commonwealth Servicemen's League Welfare Fund.' This fund which was

brought to the attention of Legion branches some time ago, is intended to assist veterans of the commonwealth who are less fortunate than their comrades in Canada. The money raised will go to provide veterans domiciliary homes, educational opportunities for veterans' children, administrative assistance to their legions, individual assistance to veterans where necessary and possible, and assistance to poppy fund organizations.

### PLEDGE \$300

The Royal Canadian Legion has pledged \$150,000 to help needy veterans who live in another country, less fortunate than Canada. The share of Ontario provincial command is \$50,000, which is approximately 50¢ (fifty cents) a head.

Members at the general meeting pledged Branch 120 to approximately \$300, which again is fifty cents per member.

Whether or not the Branch members will be asked to participate in this fund is yet to be determined.

Last Sunday at the District B convention banquet at St. Catharines president Norm Ward presented a cheque for \$150, half the amount pledged by Branch 120, to Ontario Provincial Command president, Doug MacDonald.

### HUMANITARIAN

We believe this fund is a truly humanitarian effort. Many members will recall the pictures and story of the living conditions of many veterans living in the Caribbean that appeared in the Legion magazine some time ago.

This fund is not mandatory. It is up to each Branch and each member of the Branch to ask should we participate in this worthy effort.
