## Wants 540 Acre Provincial Park in South of Halton

Halton East MPP Hon. Jim Snow plans to propose the establishment of a 540-acre provincial park in Halton County.

"I'm very interested in the park idea, and I've asked for copies of the proposals," he said in Queen's Park this week. Snow will present the plans, together with his own comments, to provincial officials involved with Parks Development and the Conservation department for their study and recommendations.

"But it's definitely all in the exploratory stages right now," he warned.

The park as proposed would extend diagonally from Bronte Road and the QEW all the way up to the intersection of the townline and Upper Middle Road, taking in all of the Bronte or Twelve-Mile Creek in the area.

### CREEK VALLEY

Nearly half the multi-million dollar park would be taken up by a roughly rectangular block in the northwest corner of the QEW and Bronte Road, with about half a mile of frontage on the QEW and nearly a mile on Bronte Road or Second Line; a smaller block slightly larger than one quarter mile square would occupy the southeast corner of the Townline and Upper Middle Road intersection, with the two joined by a wide diagonal strip using the east bank of the creek valley as its eastern boundary.

Snow said any development of the area as a park would most likely be undertaken by the province since the proposal looks to him to be pretty large for a municipality to undertake without some help.

### LARGE AREA

In addition, such a park would certainly serve the population of a very large area because of its size, the existence of the river valley, and its proximity to the QEW.
