

Georgetown Pro Plans 'New Approach' Clinics

Phil Bludd and Bud Topping teamed up to win the men's best ball which launched the golfing season at Georgetown Golf & Country Club, Saturday.

A good turnout of men's section members took part in the competition after an indoor clinic conducted by

new pro Bill Greenwood. Prizes were awarded 16 competitors at a dinner afterwards.

Greenwood will be giving his 'new approach' clinics at the club's men's nights every Wednesday.

"My aim is to improve the golfing at Georgetown Golf and Country Club," Green-

wood told the Herald. "And I hope to do it with my own approach which is a little different than the text book instruction."

Greenwood says he tailors his instruction to fit the pupil.

"Not everybody can hit the ball like Arnold Palmer,

so what makes Palmer successful doesn't necessarily work for all golfers," he said. He said a golfer's personality influences the kind of instruction he programs.

He said he hopes to have Gary Cowan, Al Balding and other notables in the golf world as guests at men's nights during the season.

Delay Final Vote On Snowmobile Restrictions

Months of work culminated in two of the necessary three readings to a regulatory by-law Monday by council. It will be submitted to the snowmobile association for perusal before becoming law.

The by-law would ban the machines from all parks except at the discretion of the Recreation Committee, from school grounds and from Guelph and Main Streets, sidewalks, and boulevards. Snowmobiles could not be operated between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m. except on public roads. And no one under 18 could operate a machine except on private property.

SOME IDEAL
Cr. Ern Hyde opposed the by-law.

He said certain parks are ideal for the sport. And he claimed council, not the Recreation Committee, should be the governing body.

Mayer Smith said the day is past when council can have its "finger in every pie" and must delegate responsibility.

MOTORIZED VEHICLES
Deputy Reeve Speight indicated that while he would support the two readings, he was making no final decision yet.

Later in the meeting another by-law received two readings, banning motorized vehicles from parks. Cr. Hyde objected to this on the same grounds.
