505 ACRE SITE

Provincial Park for Forks of the Credit

The provincial government's parks department will have a team of planners tour the 505 acre site of a planned provincial park in the Forks of the Credit area this week to come up with preliminary proposals for its development.

A spokesman for the department, John Bell, said this week, the park land which was purchased along with approximately 2,500 additional acres on the Niagara Escarpment will probably not be fully operational until 1973.

NO DATE SET

He said the department 'has had its eye on' the Credit Forks area for some time and is aware of its potential as a park. No date has been set for the start of development but Mr. Bell said officials would like to get it operational as quickly as possible.

He said that due to budgetary restrictions work would not likely start this year though the park would have the highest priority next year. He said it would be open during the period of development though facilities would be limited probably until 1973.

EXHIBIT AREA

Though no definite plans have been made yet, Mr. Bell said the park will probably feature camping grounds and hiking trails to emphasize the features of the escarpment and the geology of the Credit Valley. He said one of its main uses would probably be as a day facility to serve the Toronto - Centred Region's urban areas. The area may also have exhibit centres to show the geology, natural history and human history of the area.

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Awarded Bell Fellowship For Post Graduate Studies

Irene M. Nickel of Georgetown has been awarded a Bell Canada Centennial Fellowship for 1971-72. She was one of eight recipients of the awards, which are given annually. Miss Nickel receives \$3,500 for her studies while an additional \$1,500 is donated to the University of Guelph where she is a graduate student. Donation of funds to the university helps defray costs for the graduate student program. The Bell Fel-

lowships are for graduate studies towards a master's degree. Born 22 years ago in Fowell River B.C., Miss Nickel is to graduate this year with her BSc from the University of Guelph. Miss Nickel's graduate work will be in connection with studies which could point to the relationship of dietary fructose to disease syndromes where present knowledge has been so far based on statistical evidence only.
