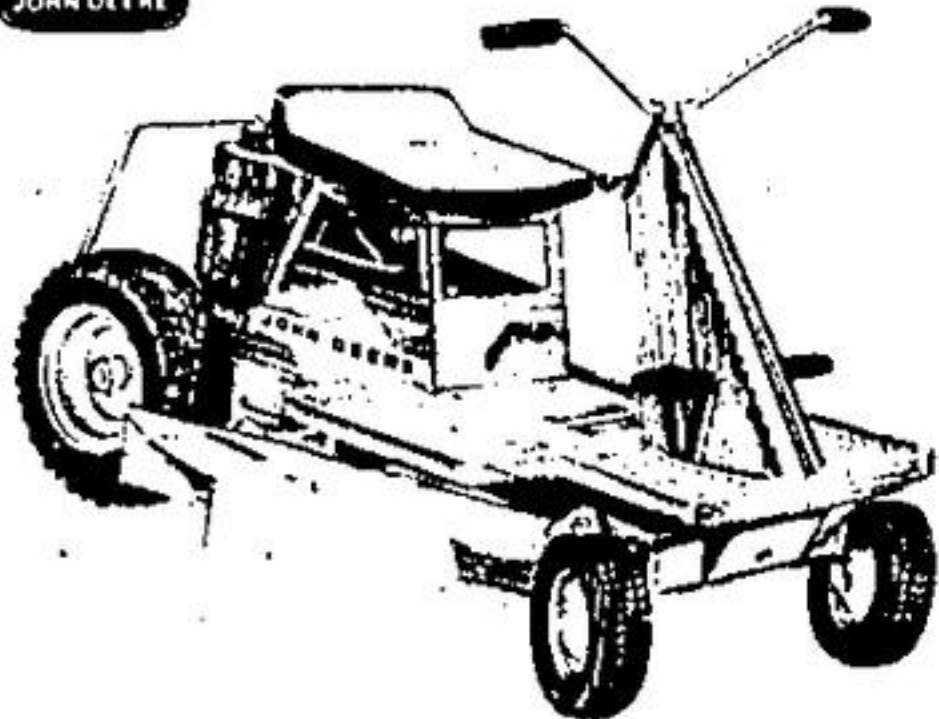

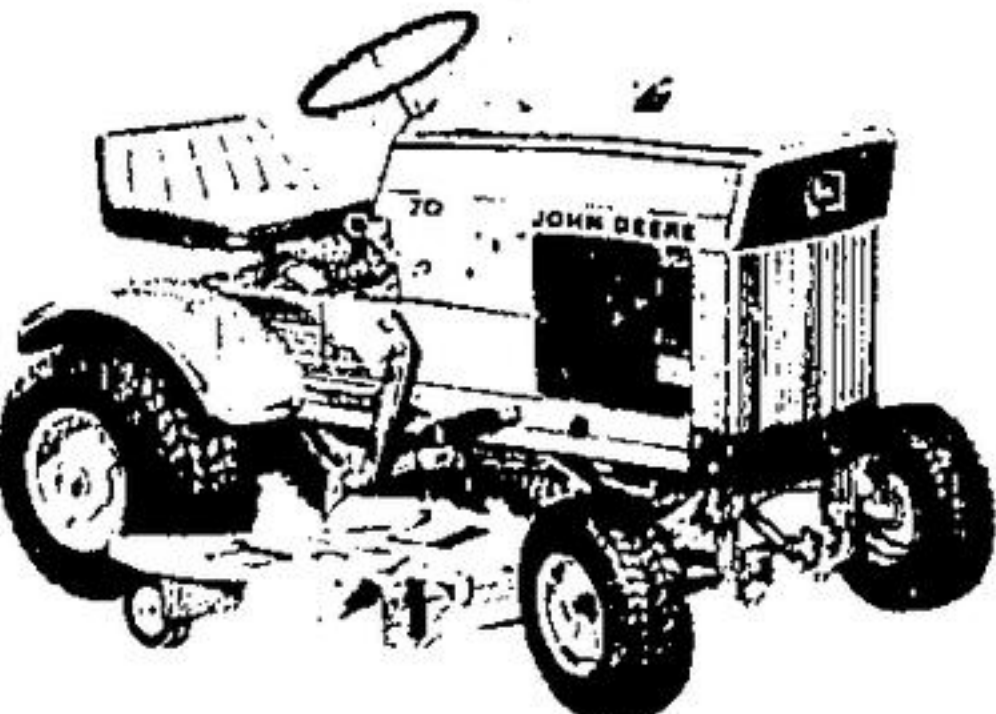

## 'Accessories for Home' Project of 4-H Girls

The Summary Day for the Home Economics Branch project "Accessories for the Home" was held Tuesday at Hillcrest United Church near Ashgrove. About 50 women attended the program, which was presented by the five participating groups: Campbellville, Norval, Nassagaweya, Silverwood and Scotch Block. Mrs. Wm. Webb of Campbellville was chairman for the afternoon.

Badges were presented to the local leaders in recognition of the time and effort they had put into the successful completion of the course in their communities.

The leaders were Mrs. W. Webb and Mrs. S. Cramp of Campbellville, Mrs. G. Pearce of Rockwood, Mrs. H. Chester and Mrs. D. Murray of Norval, Mrs. H. Marchington and Mrs. N. Anderson of Georgetown and Mrs. C. Rowney and Mrs. H. Robertson of Milton.

IMPORTANT ACCESSORIES To review some of the information covered in the project, Norval and Nassagaweya demonstrated arrangements of accessories on a book case and on a table, respectively. Norval showed samples of carpet, draperies and upholstery which made an attractive colour scheme for a living room.

Silverwood group which was composed of members from Limehouse and Ballinacree, also displayed several hand hooked rugs. Their leader, Mrs. Anderson, discussed the importance of rugs as accessories. Campbellville members spelled out

## LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

The following hand may not be too instructive but it sure was interesting. I don't know how many times I have sat with an abundance of aces and kings and failed to take as many tricks as I expected. On this hand I held only three points but I took six tricks with this three point hand.

West dealt with neither side vulnerable.

NORTH  
S-7 4 3  
H-5 4  
D-6 2  
C-8 7 6 5 4

The bidding:  
WEST NORTH EAST SOUTH  
Pass Pass 1C 1NT  
Pass Pass Dble. Pass  
Pass Pass

Opening lead: Queen of spades.

With twenty high card points, East cannot open any number of no trumps so one club is the best bid. South with 18 points decided to overcall one no trump.

This shows a balanced hand with 18 to 19 points which is exactly what he held. West and North naturally pass and East decides to reopen with a double. South passed and it was up to West.

DECIDES TO PASS

Although I didn't have as many points as I would like to have had I decided to pass. I rather liked my spade suit as a lead against no trump. North could do little but pass.

I led the spade queen. East unblocked the king and declarer von. Declarer decided to throw me back in with a spade so I would have to lead up to his hand later. After winning three spade tricks while dummy discarded a heart and East discarded two diamonds I led a low heart. East played the queen and declarer won the trick.

GOOD STORY

At this point, declarer should lead a high diamond, but that wouldn't make my story as interesting. Declarer actually led the club nine. I played the club ten and won my fourth trick. I led another low heart and partner won with the ace. Back came a heart and I took my

fifth and sixth tricks with the ten and eight of hearts. (Declarer had discarded a heart from dummy earlier.)

Unfortunately I was convinced that South held a club ten ace — either ace queen or king jack so I returned a diamond. East won this trick but declarer won the balance. However down two doubled was good for a top board.

With my three high card points I took six tricks while my partner with twenty high card points could only take her two aces.
