Esquering \$150 Grant Helps Limehouse Camp

For the first time, Esquering council made a grant to the Georgetown YMCA to run a playground in Limehouse school. Esquering okayed the grant of \$150 provided the money would be spent in the township. The playground will be held Monday, Wednesday and Friday all through July, as it has been for the past two years, but Esquering council has never been asked to contribute previously. Until this year Limehouse was covered in the YMCA door-to-door canvass, but this year no canvassers could be found.

No Building Permit? Council Will Check

Peter Bowman, 6th Line neighbour to the dragstrip, told Esquering Council an addition to the washrooms and a restaurant are being built at the dragstrip, and asked if they had a building permit. When Clerk Delmar French said they didn't, Reeve Tom Hill said the building inspector would be there in the morning. Bowman told council the charges he brought against the dragstrip were dismissed because the by-law only says when racing can be carried out but does not state when it can't.

Reeve Tom Hill reassured him the new by-law, passed later in the evening, tied everything down tight.
R. Craig spoke on the same subject, and reminded council of past abuses by the dragstrip owners. "Being a social scientist, I feel it is contrary to the laws of human behaviour to reward some for abuse," he commented.
The reeve stated the council had spent three nights on the dragstrip by-law alone, and had good advice. "We feel this is a safe one. I think you will find it a lot sounder," he concluded.
A few more restrictions were imposed on the Toronto International Dragway, as it is now named, when Esquering council Monday night passed a new and more restrictive by-law governing car racing.
The license fee remained at last year's level, \$1,000 a year for a dragstrip, \$1,500 for an unlimited track, and \$2,500 for a motorcycle track.
The dragstrip will be limited to three meets a week, with the following hours:
MAY (after Victoria Day) Friday - 3 till 11:30 p.m. Saturday 1:30 till 7:30 p.m.
JUNE, JULY, AUGUST Monday to Thursday: 2 till 10:30 p.m.; Friday and Saturday 3 till 11:30 p.m.
SEPTEMBER and OCTOBER Friday and Saturday - 3 till 11:30 p.m.
All the holidays through the summer, Victoria Day, Dominion Day, Civic Holiday, Labour Day, and Thanksgiving the hours are 1:30 till 7:30 p.m.
Sunday racing is covered in a separate by-law, under the Lord's Day Act.
CLAMP DOWN
Esquering council clamped down on the points which caused many complaints last year. The by-law stated the gates could not be opened more than two hours prior to the start of racing, and banned the running of engines until 30 minutes before race time.
The lights illuminating the race track must be turned off within 15 minutes after the last race.
This was a sore point with many residents last year who described the blazing lights as almost as annoying as the noise.
No camping will be allowed this year, a provision which was also in last year's by-law.

Would Boost Separation Fee \$200. In Township

An increase in the fee for separation of a lot from \$300 to \$500 was recommended to Esquering Council by the Committee of Adjustment, Monday night.
In addition they suggested the fee in a family transaction should be upped to \$1,000, if the land is sold within five years after the separation.
The present amount is \$300 if the land is sold within five years after the separation.
Denney Charles pointed out the Committee of Adjustment felt the increase was fair, since value of land has increased since the setting of the \$300 fee.
Council made no decision, but will discuss it in committee.

Esquering Briefs
● The OPP radar unit will be assigned to the 4th line and 17 sideroad, a letter informed Esquering council Monday night.
● Mrs. Patricia Harrington, 6 Prince Street Glen Williams sought permission to open a handicraft shop featuring local artisans, Eskimo and Indian work. She said the neighbours had no objections. Neither did council.
● Jimmy Morrison, a resident of the 1st Line, asked why the township can't do anything about the holes on the road. On being assured it would be looked after, he remarked to the road superintendent. "You haven't been down there since last September."
● Spencer Wilson, asking for snow fencing for Hornby Ball park was told he could have it on the same conditions as other years, meaning it had to be returned the next day and in good condition. He was also assured the Georgetown Fair Board would be considered for a grant, when he "put on his other hat" and appeared as a representative of the Fair Board.
