Denies Senior Schools Are Costly and Unwieldy

Dear Sir:
I must take exception to certain portions of your lead editorial in last week's paper. In particular I refer to your suggestion that the senior public school system has been a costly and unwieldy experiment, and ought to be abolished.

This casts an unfair aspersions upon schools such as Stewarston and Centennial. One need only talk to the students of these schools and observe their interest and progress to realize that contrary to your opinion, the senior public school system or some modification of it, will expand.

As you may know Centennial is one of three pilot middle school projects being operated in the county. This encompasses the grades 6, 7 and 8 as opposed to the traditional 7 and 8 in the senior public school. The general theory, upon which the middle school is

founded, provides a young student with a smooth and gradual transition from the fairly comfortable and secure junior school to the relative complex structure now found in our high schools with individual timetable etc.

To date, the results of the middle school experiment have been most gratifying and although yet to be formally evaluated, it is expected that the system will be adopted for the entire county.

It must be remembered that no matter how elaborate a school system is devised the real secret to success is the ability of the classroom teacher. In Halton County, we believe we have the teachers that can do the job and the Board is attempting to provide the most suitable environment in which their work can flourish.
