### Lived in England Near Anne's Home

Canadiana planning to visit England who have been watching the current TV series on Henry VIII will be interested in seeing the house of Anne of Cleves at Melton Mowbray.

Mrs. Dennis Brown, 11 Parkway Blvd., brought a folder to The Herald office which describes the house, now a cafe and noted for its afternoon teas. It sketches the history of the house, first a residence for monks who ministered to lepers and later coming into possession of the Crown.

King Henry gave it to Thomas Cromwell, the Earl of Essex, for his work in organizing the reformation of the church. When Cromwell fell out of favour and was beheaded, and after Henry divorced his fourth wife, Anne of Cleves, she was given the house and lived there for some years.

Melton Mowbray is Mrs. Brown's home town, so she is particularly interested in the historic house.

**NORTH HALTON REPORT**

During the week ending, May 15, 1971 officers of the Ontario Provincial Police stationed at North Halton Detachment worked a total of 955½ hours and patrolled 1,670 miles on area roads under their jurisdiction.

A total of 43 motorists received summonses for court appearances as a result of driving infractions. An additional 42 received warnings regarding their driving habits. Proceedings in provincial court held in Milton saw 125 convictions registered.

Officers investigated 43 general occurrences during this time period. Included were — 9 thefts, 3 instances of breaking and entering, 2 complaints of trespassers, 1 domestic complaint, 1 assault investigation, 4 investigations under the Liquor Control Act which resulted in 5 persons being charged, 1 impaired driver was apprehended and 2 premises were found insecure. Other occurrences were of a minor nature and required little investigative time to clear.

Seven motor vehicle collisions were recorded during the 7 day reporting period; only 2 of which resulted in injuries. Two vehicles were damaged by fire, while other mishaps were attributed to careless driving, unsafe turns and speed too fast for road or traffic conditions.

To date 7 charges have been laid against drivers involved.

Accident Prevention Personnel visited Pineview, Norval and Glen Williams public schools. Bicycle safety was discussed with approximately 454 students.
