

Hold Founder's Day Banquet — Georgetown's Two Sorority Chapters Mark 40th Birthday

This is the 40th anniversary of the Beta Sigma Phi organization, two chapters of which are in Georgetown. On April 30, 1931, the late

Walter W. Ross founded the first chapter of the Beta Sigma Phi Sorority, in Abilene, Kansas. At the time the United States were in the throes of

the depression and he felt that an organization offering social contact and cultural learning would not only brighten but enlighten the minds of many young women. The fees were nominal and have remained the same. Membership of this organization is by invitation only, and one can become a member from the early age of eighteen and enter the varying degrees as one progresses in years and knowledge.

Although the founder's dream came true little did he realize at the time, that one chapter, with seven members would escalate into a world wide organization with some 200,000 members and 9,000 chapters.

THREE YEARS AGO

Here in Georgetown the first chapter known as Zeta Alpha was formed three years ago by Mrs. Mary Ann Corbett. During their formative years the chapter have been involved in various tours and projects. One of the program highlights was a visit by the chapter to the home of the Licut. Governor of Ontario the Hon. Ross W. MacDonald at Brantford. For two years as a service project Zeta Alpha have prepared and delivered Christmas baskets for local Multiple Sclerosis patients, they have donated money for a wheelchair for a patient and last year they sold Halloween candy to raise money for research.

Since the bi-monthly meetings are held in the homes of members, membership has to be limited. Due to ever-increasing numbers the fall of 1970 saw the formation of a second chapter here in Georgetown by the following former members of Zeta Alpha: Messdames Dorothy McCarthy, Pauline Hughes, Kathleen Vickery, Deanna Butwell, Lorrie Ryan and Lois Rogers. These girls were determined to make their chapter very special and due to the fact that ten new members took their first rituals in October this chapter became a Founder's Memory Chapter and in the International Office there is a special plaque inscribed with the chapter name Georgetown, Ontario Zeta Phi and the names of the six proud founders.

Members of Zeta Phi have actively participated in many rummage sales, the sale of their projects this year including two famous Beta Sigma Phi cook books, a Fashion Show and dinner which was held at Christmas and to close their projects this year three members of the chapter participated in the Oxfam Walk whilst others helped to distribute sandwiches etc. Part of this years service project is a donation to be made to the Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital.

For the 40th anniversary all new members were entertained to a Founder's Day Banquet at The Spot-on-Seven Restaurant. The evening began by all present singing O Canada, followed by the Opening Ritual and Grace said by Deanna Butwell. Following a delicious dinner Pauline Hughes read a message of welcome to the pledges, Lois Rogers told of the chapter highlights in verse form, then Kathleen Vickery proposed a toast to the founder. From The Spot-on-Seven all members proceeded to the home of Barry and Deanna Butwell who were hosts for the remainder of the evening. Kathleen Vickery opened the second part of the evening by asking all present to say the Founder's Day Pledge after

Make All Employees RC? No, Says Board

A recommendation from the finance committee of the Halton County Separate School Board, stating that all employees must be separate school supporters, effective January 1, 1972, was quickly withdrawn, at last week's meeting, when it ran into opposition from other board members.

Trustee Jim Hourigan of Burlington questioned its legality, and maintained it contravened the labour laws.

Another trustee asked why it couldn't be done, when it was the policy of the public school board to hire only public school supporters.

Immediately two voices from the audience broke in "That's not true." One was a separate school supporter who teaches in the public school system.

Cr. Leno Braida chairman, also pointed out that it wasn't true, and said it would be a discriminatory move.

The finance committee chairman M. P. Noonan agreed to withdraw the motion, and seek legal advice.

Women's Council Studies Royal Commission Report

The May meeting of Georgetown Local Council of Women was held in the committee room of Canada Trust, Main Street on the 21st with president Mrs. G. L. Gale in the chair.

Items of correspondence were read by Mrs. R. H. Jones, including the regular news letter from the national president, to councils across Canada, dealing with events of interest. These included references to the follow-up to the report of the Royal Commission on the Status of Women, subsequent action contemplated, and action already taken.

Mrs. M. Shrubsole volunteered to act as telephone convener. Main item of current business was a discussion of plans for the celebration of the local council's fiftieth anniversary as a functioning women's group in Georgetown. Final arrangements were left with the executive to arrange at a meeting at the home of Mrs. J. H. Vickery.

Mrs. Clayton Dick, home economics convener, reported briefly urging attention of the members to an article in Chatelaine "What you can do about pollution" with suggestions as to ways in which pollution may be combated by housewives. Some discussion followed.

Mrs. Jack Neuwolfe reported for the Safety League of Canada which has designated May 30 to June 5 as water safety week, and July 1 to 7 safe boating week. The latter is especially timely in view of the great number of people who cause boating accidents because of a lack of understanding of the principles of boat management.
