## OUTDOORS

### Taped Rifles and Plenty of Nerve

The above is the heading of an article that was in the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests newsletter which I have at hand.

So... let's change the subject from rainbow to that majestic game animal of ours called the moose.

The two accused were from Michigan, and for them the date of November 25 meant that the moose season was closed. (Last fall the moose season opened on October 3, in much of northwestern Ontario, and closed on November 15 for non-residents. It extended another month, to December 15 for residents.)

**TRANSFORMATION**  
Our Michigan 'friends' subscribed to the theory that a moose hunter from Michigan can be made to look just like one from Ontario, and they set about to prove it.

First, they conspired to transform their Michigan half-ton camper into an Ontario version of the same thing. This was easy, since the truck manufacturers make them the same in both places. All that was needed was a change in license plates.

Somehow they obtained a set of Ontario plates, and bolted them on top of the Michigan ones. This would get them into the back country — perhaps past guards on logging company roads — and into the deep bush where the moose live.

**ELABORATE SCHEME**  
Next, they made certain that they brought along a popular Canadian made snowmobile. No use of attracting attention unnecessarily.

The best proof of residency though, one of them concluded, would be to present a resident moose license. With that document a fellow could really bluff things out.
