

# Brahma Bull Riding is Added Feature At This Year's Georgetown Rodeo

Contestants from as far away as the United States and Quebec will be trying to lasso some of the \$3,000 in prize money available at the second annual Georgetown Rodeo in the fairgrounds this weekend.

More than 6,000 people attended last year's two day event produced by Hugh Graham of Georgetown who is hoping to offer a bigger and better show this time.

## BRAHMA BULLS

Two problems encountered last year, dust and poor light-

ing will be remedied Saturday and Sunday, Graham told The Herald.

Added to the list of events this year will be the highly exciting Brahma bull riding considered the most dangerous event in any rodeo program because the bull tends to

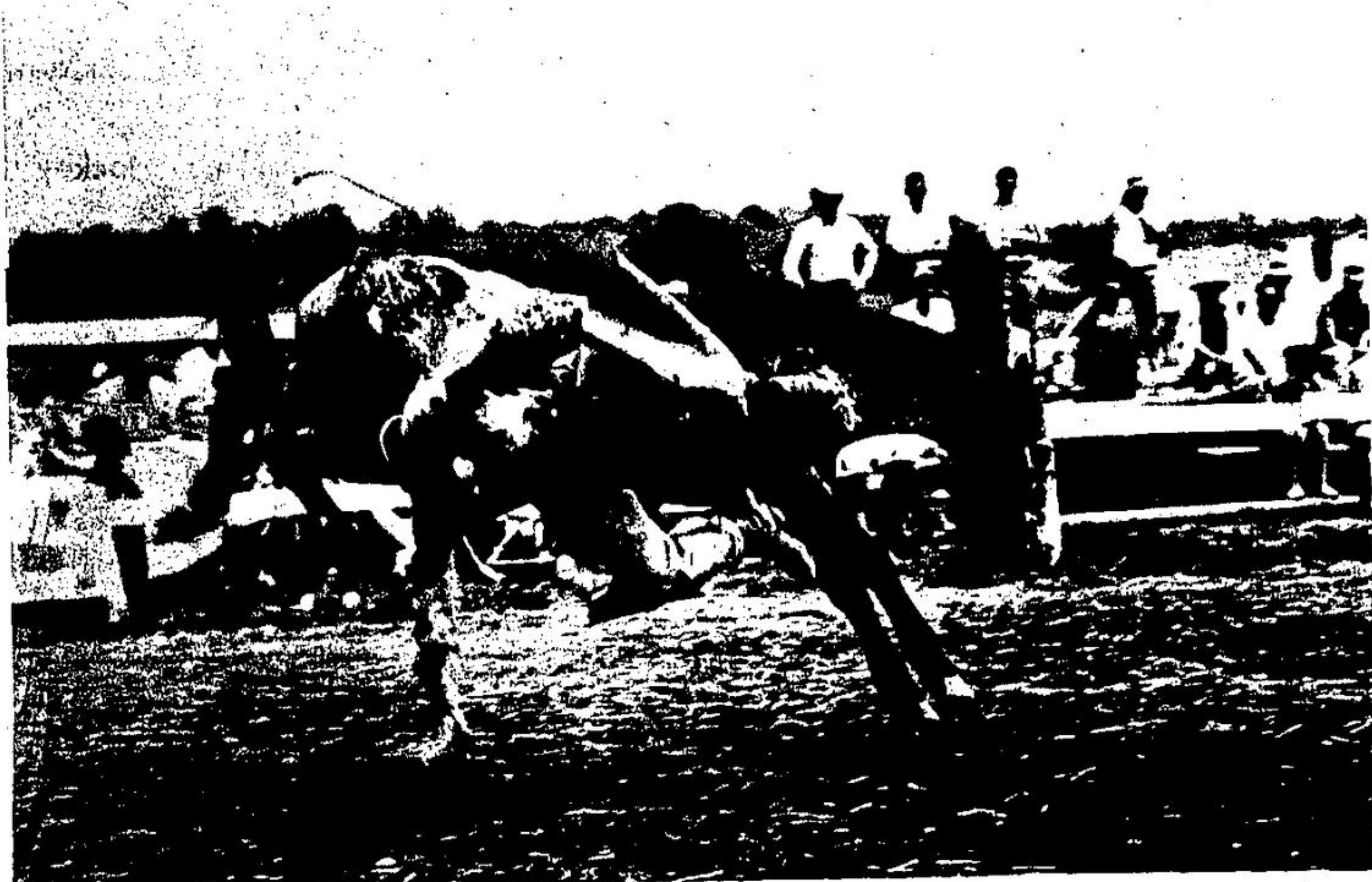
charge a fallen rider. This is where the rodeo clowns play a big part by distracting the bull's attention until the rider has scrambled to safety.

## WILD HORSES

Other events will be saddle and bareback bronc riding,

calf roping, steer wrestling, barrel and pick-up racing, and the popular wild horse race.

Children under 12 will be invited to come out of the stands and take part in the concluding event, a calf scramble.

## Rick Gourlie, 3 Others Place Well, 'Star' Bowling

Georgetown Bowl was one of the four Toronto area bowling centres to dominate the five pin division of the Toronto Star's Junior Bowling Tournament.

The entries came from many Southern Ontario bowling centres within the area bounded by Kingston, Barrie, Kitchener, Hamilton and St. Catharines.

In the tourney Georgetown collected one first place victory, two seconds and a third place finish.

Rick Gourlie paved the way by winning the 12 year old boys five pin title. With a 771 triple, Rick topped second place Mark Bojeski of Hamilton by 30 pins.

This was Rick's second tournament victory of the year. He was a member of Georgetown's Junior Boys Team who journeyed to Vancouver, B.C. in April to become National Champions.

Another member of that same team, Steven Burns placed second in the 14 year old boy's class. Steven's 785 triple placed only 12 pins down from a 777 rolled by Ed Dupuis of Toronto.

Terrie Bratkin tossed a 504

triple to place second in the 9 year old girls category. She placed behind Joan Clayton of Toronto who rolled 563.

Terrie comes from a strong family of bowlers. Her sister Diana was a member of the Bantam Girls Team who also travelled to Vancouver, placing third in the National Championships.

Yvonne Bratkin, Terrie's 14 year old sister was unable to retain her championship; but she did bowl tremendously, finishing with a 783 triple, to place third behind Cheryl Preston of Scarborough and her runner-up Denise Lord of Hamilton.
