District Holstein Red Seal Producer

Plumbroke Lois Achilles, a purebred Holstein cow in the herd of H. C. Reid, Milton, has recently been awarded a Red Seal production certificate by the Holstein - Friesian Association of Canada. In five lactations on twice a day milking Lois produced 114,887 lbs. milk containing 4,596 lbs. fat, average test 3.99% butterfat. In her latest lactation, as a seven year old in 305 days on twice a day milking, she produced 23,824 lbs. milk containing 994 lbs. fat, average test 4.05% butterfat. This record has a Breed Class Average of 200% for milk and 221% for fat.

Gold Ribbon Certificate Awarded Norval Holstein

Robros Fond Min, a purebred Holstein cow in the herd of D. W. Cleave, Norval, has recently been awarded a Gold Ribbon, production certificate by the Holstein - Friesian Association of Canada. In twelve lactations on twice a day milking Min produced 205,417 lbs. milk containing 8,405 lbs. fat, average test 4.09% butterfat. In her latest lactation, as a fifteen year old in 305 days on twice a day milking, she produced 16,499 lbs. milk containing 699 lbs. fat, average test 4.24% butterfat. This record has a Breed Class Average of 159% for milk and 184% for fat.
