DEPARTMENT OF LANDS & FORESTS FISH AND WILDLIFE REVENUE

In 1948, \$1,156,094 was collected for non-resident angling licenses. In 1970, \$1,247,268 was collected for non-resident angling licenses.

Resident angling licenses introduced January 1st 1969 accounted for \$151,533. In 1970 \$1,660,094 was paid in for the same.

Revenue from non-resident hunting licenses increased from \$453,790 in 1948 to \$2,092,522 in 1970.

Resident bear licenses increased in revenue from \$2,100 in 1962 to \$8,798 in 1970.

Resident deer licenses increased from \$205,827 in 1948 to \$870,576 in 1970.

Resident moose licenses revenue went from \$11,878 to \$698,139 in 1970.

Resident ground hog licenses increased in revenue from \$6,618 in 1948 to \$92,030 in 1970.

Resident hunting (gun) licenses revenue increased from \$139,983 in 1948 to \$899,906 in 1970.

and one must remember as the line lengthens out a longer pause is required between the backward and forward movements of the rod. When learning it's best to use a short line for a while.

Another thing to remember is to go where you know there is trout, such as a pond where you pay to fish.

Remember to mix it up if they don't take the fly good. On top use the count down system before the retrieve is started and I might add it's important to watch the fly line for twitch back as the fly is sinking, many a good trout are taken this way.

That's all for now! So tight lines. Enjoy the outdoors and safe journey.
