

Over 6000 Fans View Second Annual Rodeo

Over 6,000 cowboy fans jammed the park Saturday and Sunday to watch Georgetown's second annual rodeo, produced by 23 year old Hugh Graham of Limehouse.

The dust swirled as broncs tossed their riders, and flying hooves narrowly missed them in America's roughest sport. It was rougher this year with the

introduction of bull riding. In this event the cowboy holds onto a long rope looped around the middle of the Brahma bull, who is only too eager to get rid of the unwanted rider. Clowns distract the bull after the rider has been thrown, since the only way to dismount from a bull is to jump voluntarily or be thrown.

Another spectacular event was bull dogging, where the rider plunges from the back of a speeding horse onto the neck of a running steer, grasps the animal by the head, and wrestles him to the ground.

The events included bare-back bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, calf roping, bull dogging, bull riding, pick-up race, barrel race, flag race and wild horse race. The highlight of the day for the kids under twelve was the calf scramble. Here, the children, over 100 of them, each equipped with a piece of rope tried to catch and tie the rope around the calf, then bring him over the finish line.
