NO SURPRISE — Kerr Unanimous Choice of Halton West Conservatives

It was almost a foregone conclusion, but in the dicey game of politics there are often late-play upsets.

However, none were predicted, and no surprises rolled Halton West's smoothly run Progressive Conservative nomination in Acton last Wednesday night.

Minister of Energy and Resources George Kerr, the sitting member and Halton's first provincial cabinet minister, was the unanimous choice of Burlington, Nassagaweya, Esquesing and Acton supporters rallying to the Tory cause in the Acton high school auditorium.

STANDING OVATION
The 47 year old Burlington lawyer first elected in 1963, was nominated by Burlington YPC president Cam Jackson. Speyside School principal Gary Dawkins of Acton, seconded the nomination.

Kerr won a standing ovation from the 500 seat convention, as he negotiated a path to the platform already occupied by cabinet colleagues Minister of Mines Leo Bernier and

Ministers without Portfolio, James Snow (Halton East), and Dr. Richard Potter (Quinte)

OLDEST TORY
Acton Mayor Les Duby, Halton Warden and Acton Reeve Dr. Frank Oakes and the county's oldest voting Tory, Charles Kelley Browne were also waiting on stage to greet the star of the political show.

C. K., who will be 101 in June came close to up-staging a cast of VIP speakers, including the affable Minister of Mines, Halton East's Jim Snow and Dr. Potter.

BATTLE ORDERS
Introduced by chairman and convention organizer Robbie Foster of Burlington, and asked to 'say a few words' Acton's doughty centenarian with Mayor Duby as escort, marched to the podium and gave Halton P-C's their marching battle orders.

"Make sure you get out and vote in the next election, because we're going to need all the support we can get. We all have to put our shoulders be-

The convention got under way about an hour late, although registrations were begun on the dot.

The only miss in an on-target bill was the absence of new education minister Robert Welch unavoidably detained in an earlier platform role.

Plan Security Guards To Forestall Vandals

Vandalism is on the increase as a result of this vandalism the Halton Region Conservation Authority has decided to place a patrol of security guards at their areas at Kelso, Rattlesnake Point and Crawford Lake.

"We have been remarkably fortunate at our areas with the lack of vandalism in recent years," said Joan Rollings, information officer for the Credit Valley Conservation Authority. "The only area experiencing acts of vandalism recently has been the reservoir at Orangeville."

On a couple of occasions the gatehouse has been broken into and the gates to the spillway opened but the area is checked every day so little damage has been done.

"We always have a patrol on when we have campers in our areas in case they need assistance but we have had no call to employ them on a full time basis at our extensively used areas," said Mrs. Rollings. Police patrols along the borders of the areas was given as one of the reasons for the lack of vandalism at Credit Authority areas in recent years.

Domtar Employee 40 Years, Was War Veteran, Fireman

A retired employee of Domtar Fine Papers Ltd. and veteran of World War I, Frederick Armstrong, 11 McNabb Street, died in Georgetown hospital on May 28. He was 85.

Son of William C. and Margaret Henry Armstrong, Frederick Nassau Armstrong was born in Streetsville where he attended school, later moving to Glen Williams and then to Georgetown. He served from 1918 to 1918 with the 164th Battalion, 2nd Motor Machine Gun Brigade.

In 1920 he married Pearl Boomer in St. George's Church and they had lived in their McNabb Street home since then. Mr. Armstrong was an employee of the then Alliance Paper Mills for over 40 years when he retired.

He was a member of St. George's Anglican Church, Credit Masonic lodge, Orion Odd Fellows lodge and Loyal Orange Lodge 245; belonged to Branch 120, Canadian Legion and had served as a member of the Georgetown Volunteer Fire Department.

He leaves his wife and two children, Doris of Baltimore, Maryland, and William of St. Lambert, P.Q., four grandchildren, Kim, Guy, Gary and Kristin; and a sister Mrs. A. A. Matthews of Paris. He was predeceased by brothers and sisters Frances Jane, Margaret Ann, John, William and Joseph.

Rev. L. V. Pocock conducted the funeral service at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home, on Friday and interment was in Greenwood Cemetery. Pallbearers were Fred J. Armstrong, Sam Penrice, John T. Armstrong, Harry Savings, Aubrey Grant and Victor Mossey, Maple.

For Farm Equipment Centre —
**Seeks Commercial Zoning
For 5th Line, Hwy. Corner**

Application for the ultimate commercial zoning of land on the corner of Highway 7 and the Fifth Line, west of Georgetown was made by lawyer Ken Langdon at Esquesing Council's regular meeting recently.

Representing Horat Baron, owner of the land, Mr. Langdon told council plans call for establishment of a farm equipment sales and service business service station and eventually a farmer's market, restaurant & motel on the property, presently used for farming.

BUSY CROSSROAD
Mr. Langdon claimed the 5th Line is perhaps the busiest crossroad between Acton and Georgetown, excepting the 7th Line. He suggested the property is in an ideal site to serve transients, especially since a provincial highway passes directly in front. He also pointed out there is already some industrial use of land on the 5th Line, south towards Limehouse.

WIDE FRONTAGE
Of the approximately 1,000 feet frontage on Highway 7, necessary for construction of the business, 270 feet would be used for the farmers' market, 200 for the service station, 400 feet for the equipment sales and retail outlet and 125 feet for the restaurant.

Mr. Langdon made it clear Mr. Baron would use the equipment sales portion strictly for selling farm equipment and has no intention of turning it into a junkyard.

Township planning board has already approved the application in principle.
