

Pre-schoolers' Day Creative Fun And Exercise at Glen Nursery

Unlike most pre-school classes, Glen Williams Nursery School welcomes both full and half day children to its program. The day school, operated at 25 Mountain Street in Glen Williams by supervisor Mrs. Rita Braun held an open house June 2 and 3 evenings. Mrs. Braun trained for two

years in pre-school education at Ryerson, and her assistant, Christie Gold is gaining formal education in pre-school education at Sheridan College. The enrolment at the Glen Williams Nursery School varies from a dozen to 22 depending on the time of year with the winter

time seeing the largest registration. A typical day starts with milk and cookies, a session on the outside playground equipment, or riding on the bike and trike track, then washroom routine where the youngsters have their own combs, face cloths, towels, followed by a full cre-

Teenage Welfare is Well In Hand Here, Says Gray

There will be "very few" Halton County teenagers affected by the recent change in regulations giving the officials discretionary power over who should get assistance. Jim Gray, director of Halton social and family services department, said this week that because his office had taken a strong line against teenagers who left home to draw welfare there will be little change in the local picture.

COULD NOT COPE
"We have about 35 students who are receiving assistance," Gray said. "These we are completely satisfied are justified because the home situation is such they would not have been able to cope."

He said a similar number of Halton teenagers had left homes that had been satisfactory and applied for aid. These youths had been turned down because their homes were still open to them he explained.

HALTON PUSH
Gray said the recent change in provincial regulations giving local welfare administrators power to decide whether applicants under 18 should qualify under the General Welfare Assistance Act was as a result of a stand taken by the Halton office.

One teenager who had been refused assistance by the Halton office on the grounds his

REVERSED
Changes in the regulations have reversed this situation. Gray said the support and decisions of the county social and family service committee had been most valuable in bringing the matter to the Ontario departmental level for review of regulations. The Halton committee is under the chairmanship of Ron

Harris of Milton. Toronto, by comparison, Gray said, will have a large number of young people who, until now, have been receiving assistance, but will now be forced to return to their homes or find jobs.

Cr. Ern Hyde, who had read the report earlier termed it "shocker and an eye opener." He suggested the town hire a tree specialist to investigate and perhaps save the trees.

Council decided to ask the consultant who prepared the report on Main Street trees to attend a meeting to give his opinion and estimate of costs.

They also decided to write various forestry departments of universities to see if the project could be done as a student one, thus saving the town money and giving the students a real problem to rather than a theoretical one.

"If it comes to a choice between tree planting and saving the older trees" said Cr. Joan Smith, "I'd say save the big existing trees first."
