In fact everything is growing but the fish, at least I'm led to believe that, because every time I go out locally all I get is small speckled trout which I return to the water.

The evening of June 1st led me to believe I had broken the jinx, just before darkness set in, I set the small fly into what I thought was a good keeper, while playing the trout.

I thought, well it's a good keeper but not much of a fighter, after benching the prize on a sand bar, I found out my good keeper was only about 7" long and was entangled in about a freedom over the deal. Well any half pound of green mess.

The small trout gained his way I will try again some other time.

**NO EXCUSES**  
Perhaps next time I will not have to make excuses such as "Oh, I just arrived here" or "I just came out for a half hour of relaxation" or "Oh, I'm just fooling around with a few small trout I intend to put them back anyway."

That's about the way it goes because I always meet someone who will ask, and then more than often will lift the lid of his creel and show me some nice ones from 10 to 14 inches.

Of course they are always helpful. They inform me that next time you come out go down further towards the swamp, that's where all the trout are. I always thank them of course. Oh yes, and they remind me to take an ample supply of black gnats because

that's what they are taking.

**RARE FEATHERS**  
Last weekend at Curt Church's trout pond in the Hockley Valley, I was asked to help a person who was learning to use the fly rod.

He informed me that it wasn't his outfit, he had rented it from Curt. I found out that the leader was 14 feet long, so I shortened it by 6 feet. Then I was told in a pleasant manner where to tie on the fly. Of course, I said "do you think I don't know where to tie this dog-gone fly on." Then he added that he was a whiz at tying flies — "Oh yes, you can believe it," he said. "And feathers, brother I have some real rare ones even some of the bird called the road runner.

I might say about this time I felt like running all the way back to the lower end of the pond, where some nice rainbow trout were rising. Instead I politely listened while he told me of some of his experiences while salmon fishing in Newfoundland.

When I was leaving the dock I could hear his fly line swishing back and forth. I'm sure he must have taken some nice ones before dark.

The evening ended around the campfire where Curt Church served us some nice trout. Curt has a special way of seasoning them and the celery flakes were not left out. They were delicious.

We were the first ones to leave as it was getting late, and the last words I heard were "yes you can believe it I have more rare feathers for fly tying than you guys have."

So, I guess it all goes with an evening's fishing at Curt Church's trout pond.

**PINE RIVER FISHING AREA**  
This provincial fishing area is located 2 miles east of Hornings Mills on the Terra Nova River Road.

It's not fully developed as yet the main pond and two smaller ones cover approximately 12 acres.

The first Pine River fishing area sign, which is a small one

directs you in on a dead end road, cars must be parked along side it. The Pine River which is open to the public is nearby. Further down on the Terra Nova road is another parking area and the larger pond is inside the gate. Much to my surprise I recognized the area as the same one I fished in 30 years ago. It's a natural for a conservation park. The water in the area is very pure and clean looking.

The Department wishes to stress the fact that this is a Provincial Fishing area and as such the catch limit is five trout per angler. This means five trout, whether brook trout, rainbow trout, or a combination of these two species.

The area boasts an excellent natural rainbow and brook trout population and, in addition, will be regularly stocked throughout the season.

Access to the area is free. The management only ask that you leave the area as you found it.

That's all for now. "I'm going fishing". So light lines. Enjoy the outdoors and safe journey.
