Five Farmers Sign as Hosts In Urban-Rural Exchange

Five area farmers have signed up to take part in the new urban-rural exchange program co-ordinated by the Extension and Home Economics Branches of the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food. About 200 host families will be needed in Halton County.

Program co-ordinator Miss Evelyn Weatherston hopes to fill the quota by the end of the month. She has forms for participants at her office at the Department of Agriculture office in Milton.

This is considered to be a very valuable program for those farmers and their families who participate. For years farmers have complained, "If only the people in the city could see the way we live, the problems of finances, weather and technology which we must meet and overcome, and the hours to which we must submit ourselves in order to make a living, they would understand why the price of bread, milk and wheat are rising." Mrs. Weatherston said.

This is the opportunity for farmers to show city people through personal experience, the pleasures and problems of farm life in 1971. The urban-rural exchange is organized in such a manner to allow urban students aged 12 to 15 from cities of 20,000 plus to spend one week each on a farm in a nearby agricultural community.

These young people will be expected to participate in the regular farm life. The youth

will help the family in any way possible as they go about the day-to-day living. It's all part of the learning experience for youth which is the main objective.

The participants in this program are young people who have never lived on a farm nor have any other chance to visit a farm for any period of time.

Six Georgetown Miles are Now County Street Concern

It's official now, six miles of streets in Georgetown are county roads.

County Council, meeting recently, gave final approval to several by-laws which outlined the takeover procedure.

Although the county takeover of the municipal streets will not make any change in traffic flows, it will mean a favourable change to the taxpayer. The streets will continue to be maintained by the municipalities but the cost will be borne by the county.

The towns will bill the county for any work done on the roads and will only pay about 3.15 per cent of the county's 50 per cent cost responsibility. The province kicks in the other 50 per cent under municipal grants system for road maintenance.

The assumption of the streets is a small part in a large scale

Selection is being made through the elementary and secondary schools of the urban community.

All participants in the program, the city youth, the farmers and his family, have been insured in case of accident and liability. The involved urban youth will be briefed prior to the farm visit on the type of farm he or

she will be visiting and on farm safety. "These highly impressionable young people will be the future consumers of agricultural products. What more effective way of telling about and selling a product than letting people become involved in its production?" Mrs. Weatherston told The Herald.

takeover of certain roads by the county in an effort to lay out a pattern of regional roads and streets.

Stretched over a 10 year period, the takeover plan was approved several months ago when the county council adopted a report on Halton Rd. needs.

Roads in Georgetown being taken over are 3.25 miles of Mountainview Rd., 1.4 miles of Maple Ave., 1.43 miles of River Dr. and 1.85 miles of Main St.

Reconstruction of 1.1 miles of Mountainview Rd. is also part of the takeover project. That will cost \$250,000.

The only exceptions in the takeover are that the municipalities pay the full costs of installing sanitary sewers, sidewalks and street lights and the maintenance costs on those items.

Other roads being taken over by the county this year include a stretch of Oakville's seventh Line from Drumquinn north Hwy. 401, a several mile stretch of Steeles Ave. near Hornby and a short stretch of Britannia Rd. near Omagh.

LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

Bridge writers are always wringing about hands that could have been made if only declarer had played a certain way or could have been defeated if the defence had only led a certain card. Too often we overlook the hands that really cannot be made but declarer must try to make the contract anyway.

The opponents can only see their own hand and dummy. Often declarer's task is simply to have them make a mistake early enough to give declarer his contract. Here is just such a hand played last week at the Acton Bridge Club. North dealt with North-South vulnerable.

NORTH
S-K Q 7
H-K 4
D-A 10 7 3
C-A 8 8 2

WEST EAST
S-3 S-4 3
H-10 7 5 2 H-A 9 8 6 3
D-Q 9 8 5 4 D-K J 8 2
C-Q 9 4 C-10 3

SOUTH
S-A J 10 8 5 4 2
H-Q J
D-void
C-K J 7 5

The bidding:
NORTH EAST SOUTH WEST
1 NT Pass 2 C Pass
2 D Pass 3 S Pass
4 S Pass 6 S All Pass

Opening lead: five of diamonds. North has a routine one no trump opening bid. Over it, South chose to use Stayman. This is perfectly safe since North cannot pass. When North shows no four card major, South forced with three spades. If North persisted in no trump, South would correct to four spades.

PINPOINTED
North's bid of four spades must show a three card suit to an honour. Over 2 clubs he denied a four card suit and over three spades, he would bid 3 no trump with a doubleton. Having pinpointed the spade support, South proceeded directly to six spades.

After the diamond lead and dummy is spread, declarer takes stock. Prospects are not good with both a heart and club loser likely. The best chance is to let the defence make a mistake. Declarer should duck the first diamond and ruff in his hand.

SPADE LED
A spade is led to dummy's king and a low heart returned. What would East do? South is void in diamonds having ruffed the first trick. Can South be

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short in hearts as well? It does not seem likely. I am sure that most Easts would duck, keeping their heart ace for the king in dummy.

HOME FREE

Now declarer is home free. Dummy is re-entered with a trump and declarer's last heart can be discarded on the diamond ace. Now declarer can lose a club and still make 12 tricks. Last week's winners at Acton Bridge Club — 1st, North-South Mrs. Kay Campbell, Bart Fisher; 2nd Midge and Frank Hampshire. First East-West: Mrs. Betty Ashley, Cam Sinclair; 2nd, Jack Coats, Gloria Coats.

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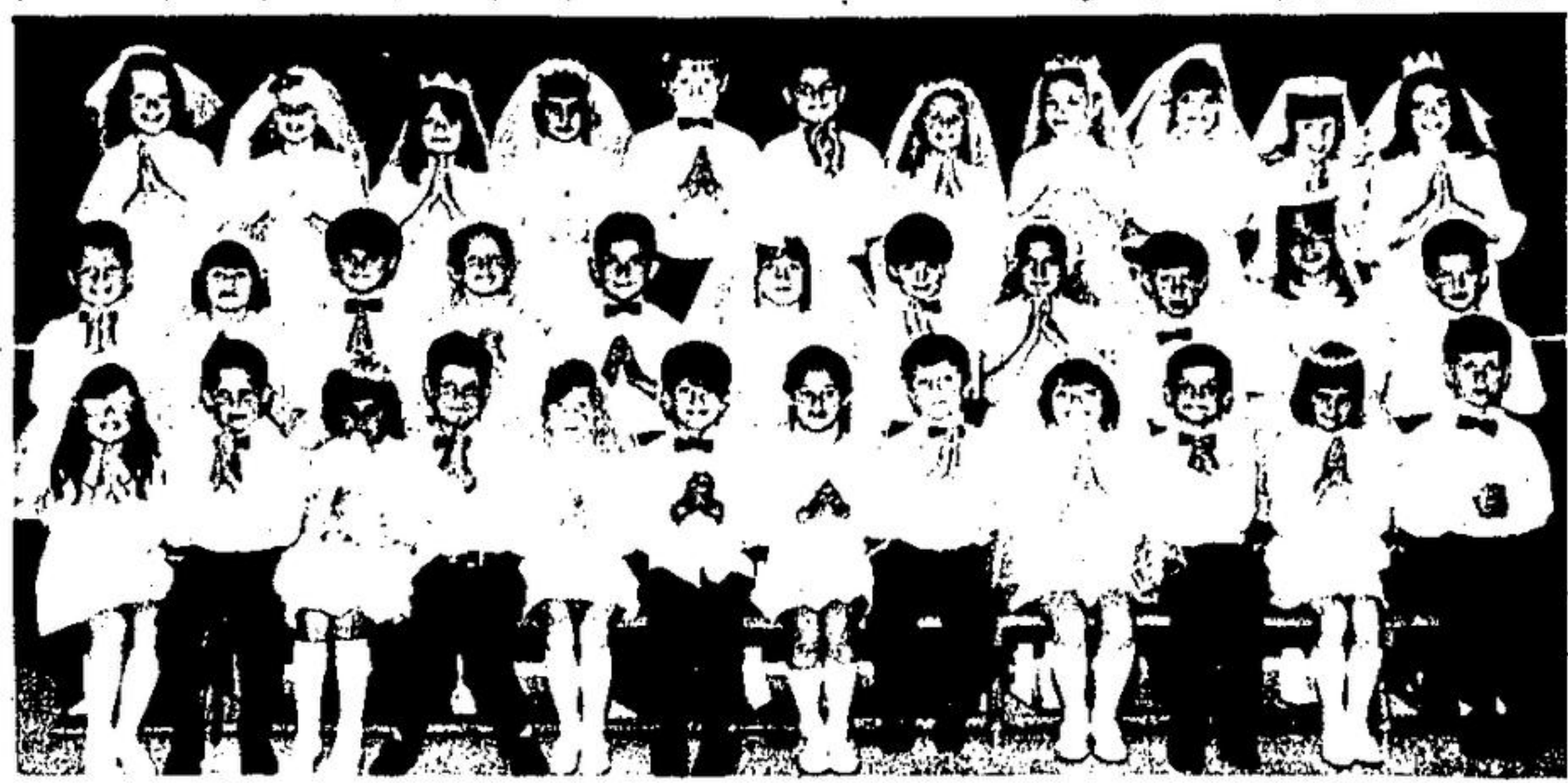
