Highway Church Building Planned for Pentecostals

Georgetown Pentecostal church hopes to build a new church on the east side of highway 7, lot 22 near the poultry plant just beyond the western limits of the town.

In his letter to Esquousing council, Rev. Jack McCallum asked if a church building would be allowed in that location. Quoting from the planning act, Cr.
