



**WHAT THIS COUNTRY NEEDS IS A GOOD FIVE CENT CIGAR**

Of course, Mr. Munro's health department may soon have a warning placed on the box that smoking the cigar could be dangerous to your health. And that inflation that the prime minister told us was beaten for a few days anyway—will mean your good nickle cigar will likely cost fifteen or twenty cents.

Maybe the country needs something else. When this week's federal-provincial conference was being planned, Mr. Trudeau suggested the country needed a new way of amending the constitution. On the other hand, Mr. Davis and some of the other premiers thought the country needed a solution to some of its financial problems, especially unemployment.

A Social Creditor might suggest that the people of the country all need a raise in pay, like our M.P.'s (or most of them) voted for themselves.

The list could be endless. Perhaps Mr. Trudeau put his finger on the greatest need when he was helping Hamilton celebrate her 125th birthday last week. Some young people were singing some of the popular songs, and the prime minister got a big hand when he quoted the line about what the world needs now is love.

But that's a hard thing to legislate—say for summer hitch-hikers, for the people who use polluted lakes or littered parks, for the unborn child in its mother's womb, for former prisoners, for dying refugees in India. Even if governments wanted to, they would find it difficult to legislate love. Look at all the fuss there's been about summer hostels for young hitch-hikers. The old phrase that religion and politics don't mix could be put in modern terms: love isn't practical politics.

That's because it asks us to stop looking at ourselves, and have a little concern for others. We use concern and love as slogans, complain because others don't show them, and comfort ourselves that "we're as good as anybody else." There's a bit of Pharisee in all of us.

We're in favour of helping others—individually or collectively—as long as it doesn't demand much of us. A favorite topic for political cartoons (even in the Herald) is the plight of Id Uno Who, the taxpayer, being forced to shell out for this or that. Such cartoons are popular because it's easier to arouse sympathy for yourself than for someone else.

We find that as true at home or work as in politics. Part of the sensitivity rage is to help people to become aware, not just of their own feelings, but of the people and the world around us. The first step towards love is to be aware of others, not to blinker ourselves so we see only what is comfortable.

If we want to echo the songs of today (and to echo our prime minister), that what the world needs now is love, then we've got to become more aware of the world—both where it's close to us, and where it seems remote—and more concerned about it. Love will never become practical politics until it becomes popular.

## Norval Anglicans Marking Century and Quarter History

A century and a quarter ago St. Paul's Anglican Church in Norval was built. To celebrate this event a number of former clergy are being invited to return during the year.

On June 6 the parish welcomed back the Most Rev. G. F. C. Jackson, Archbishop of Qu'Appelle, who had been rector during the depression years of the mid-thirties.

He pointed out how the prayer book makes mention of young ministers in the words of the Benedicite: "O all ye green things of the earth, bless ye the Lord" and reminisced about some of what he as a "green thing" remembered about his first parish here. At that time the village was sending boxcars of vegetables to

the drought-stricken west. Contrasting life 35 years ago with the present, he typified today as a period of unbelief in which Christians must witness to their faith by affirming it at public worship and by the quality of their lives.

The Qu'Appelle liturgy (a form of communion service used in his diocese) was used. (Five years ago, Norval's present minister had spent a summer working as a student in Qu'Appelle diocese.)

The boys choir and a combined adult choir from St. Paul's and St. Alban's sang lively anthems. The congregation, especially some of the "old-timers" got a chance to talk with Archbishop Jackson at a lunch put on by the ladies' guild after the service.

Halton's first county engineer, Roy Foster Smith, who held that position for 42 years died Monday in Oakville hospital.

He is survived by his wife Meta at 155 Nancy St., a daughter, Mrs. W. John Poole of Oakville and a son Stuart Smith of London. The funeral service was yesterday.

Smith, who became county engineer in 1924, played an important part in preparing Halton's road system for the age of heavy traffic.

He had come to Halton to work on the Tansley Bridge and later the Dundas Highway bridge of Sixteen Mile Creek.

He also did consulting work for Halton and municipalities within the county.
