Interesting Craft Display Hobbyists Join Rug Guild

More than 500 people attended the Rug Show and Hobby Fair sponsored by the Georgetown Rug Hooking Guild last Friday, including pupils from Grade 4, Limehouse Public School.

The central display in the hall, was of work by Guild members, who had produced a comprehensive range of hooking from the traditional rugs to cushions, footstools, wallhangings and pictorials.

Mrs. Sonja Bell of Georgetown displayed oilpaintings and Mr. & Mrs. F. Bessem also of Georgetown, showed a large collection of tumbled and polished gem stones many of which had been hand set into jewellery.

Mrs. N. Booth, Scarborough, brought a display of Decoupage. She cuts out pictures from magazines and greetings cards and after gluing them onto wood surfaces, she alternately varnishes and sands them until the whole surface is smooth and a very decorative effect is made.

The Rock and Mineral Club of Brampton was represented by Mrs. C. Calver of Schomberg, with her son Michael, and Mr. Ian Lang of Nobleton helping. As well as cutting and polishing rocks, they had display of fossils and rock structures.

Mrs. Pat Dams and her daughter, Jane, from Terra Cotta were engaged in crewel embroidery and Batik against a very colourful background of their finished work.

Mrs. B. Ertel, Hillsburgh, showed rug braiding and Mrs. D. Little, Snelgrove, and Mrs. I. Ford, of Hamilton had a display of different types of leather craft.

J. Langedyke, Georgetown was at work on model making and showed many kits which will be available in the new Hobby store opening soon.

Mr. & Mrs. G. Grohe of Norval had a large collection of Ceramics and they were helped by Mrs. M. Macleod of Bramalea.

Mrs. Win Lakin of Burlington showed many dyed swatches and patterns for rug hooking, some of which were being used on pictorials demonstrated by Mrs. Lois Guenther and Mrs. Jean Weibourne also from Burlington.

Tony Meers, Georgetown, was working throughout the day, on a portrait in oils of Mrs. Jan Teulier, a Guild member, while Mrs. M. Murphy from Kleinburg made plaques and paper weights using arrangements of dried flowers.

Mrs. Vera Robinson of Rexdale demonstrated the art of making dolls using dried apples for faces and showed the apples in various stages of preparation.

The Palette and Pencil club of Georgetown invited visitors to an Art Show which included oil paintings, sketches and several pieces of collage. Mrs. Kay Rossal, Niagara Falls showed Danish Wool painting for which she has been awarded prizes at the Canadian National

Exhibition. She was helped by Mrs. Ethel Matthews also of Niagara Falls. Miss Inez Thompson, Hillsburgh, showed carved wooden birds many of which were fashioned into brooches and pins and Mr. & Mrs. H. Woodcroft of Georgetown showed a range of Ceramics.

The Women's Institute of Limehouse demonstrated rug hooking in which they have recently completed a course and showed a large collection of finished rugs. The Catholic Women's League served light refreshments throughout the day and maintained a steady trade.

All these artists and craftsman gave their time and services voluntarily.
