Urge Government Grants Christian School System

Gerald Hessels of Glen Williams was one of 50 people who petitioned the Ontario government yesterday to make grants available to all school systems which are open to the public and meet government regulations established for all systems.

The delegation represented the Ontario Alliance of Christian Schools. Georgetown District Christian School on the 7th Line is one of the group.

The 120,000 signature petition was presented to Premier William Davis and Education Minister Robert Welch.

NOT OPEN
The delegation claims that, while it is permissible for a parent to send his child to an independent private school, this imposes severe financial penalty, as high as \$1,000 a year, at present.

They say that the public school system is not open to all citizens, only to those who agree with its philosophy of education. The fact that 50,000 Ontario children attend non-supported public schools substantiates this.

PRIOR RIGHT
The brief refers to a United Nations declaration that parents have a prior right to choose the kind of education that shall be given to their children.

And it quotes from the Hall-Dennis Report, that every child is entitled to access to educational facilities for which his talents qualify him and that no condition of race, religion, language or background be allowed to impede his progress to full citizenship.

STATISTICS
A salient point in the brief is in statistics. If the 8,438 students now attending Christian schools were in public schools, this would add over two and a half million dollars in grants to the public school system. This money should go to the Christian school system, according to the reasoning of the petitioners.
