LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

Half the battle in bridge is a thing called tempo. It's not just sufficient to take tricks but often it's when you take your tricks that count. Here is an example from a game earlier this year.

South dealt with neither side vulnerable.

NORTH
S-Q J 9 8 6
H-10 7
D-K J 10 6 3
C-4

WEST
S-A 4 3 2

The bidding:

Opening lead — four of hearts. South probably should not have pushed on to game opposite the misfit that North had announced but who can argue with success?

VERY FORTUNATE
Declarer was very fortunate on the opening lead. When East failed to produce an honor, declarer is assured of three heart tricks. He should be able to get five club tricks so another trick must be found in order to make three no trump.
If declarer attacks clubs immediately he will go down to

defeat. The defence will get the lead twice and clear the heart suit. The best plan is to keep the opponents in the dark as to what is going on. This is where the tempo or timing comes in.

LEAD NINE
At trick two declarer should lead the nine of diamonds. It would be a most exceptional defender who would play his ace in West's position. Once a diamond has been stolen, declarer should revert to his club suit. He plays the jack and West will win.

West continues with the heart queen, won by declarer's ace.

The ace of clubs followed by a low club will clear the suit. Fortunately, East has another heart and will probably clear the suit. Most defenders would be reluctant to break the spade suit at this point.

SCRAMBLES HOME
Declarer scrambles home with nine tricks before the defense discovers that it has five winners.

If declarer had tried clubs first, before stealing a diamond trick, the defense would have ample opportunity to signal their high cards and West would hold on to his two aces plus some good hearts.
