



Induction Service for New St. George's Rector

Bishop John Bothwell, newly elected Anglican Co-adjutor Bishop of Niagara, paid his first official visit to Georgetown on Sunday afternoon.

He officiated at the installation and induction service for the Rev'd Robert Gallagher, who became rector of St. George's Church a month ago.

Assisting in the service was the Rev'd Clarence Mitchell, Archdeacon of Trafalgar and rector of St. George's, Guelph and the rural dean, the Rev'd David Luxton of Burlington.

COMPLEMENT
Mr. Gallagher came to Georgetown from St. Margaret's, Hamilton and for his induction

had asked a layman at that church, Ferrers Clark to preach the sermon.

Mr. Clark, whose home is in Auckland, New Zealand, is studying for his doctorate in science at McMaster University. He based his sermon on science and religion, pointing out that they complement each other, rather than being at odds, as some people would believe.

KEYS TO CHURCH
The churchwardens, William McNally and Henry Court took part in the processional, and Mr. Court handed the keys to the church to the new rector.

Following the service, Mr. and Mrs. Gallagher and their children, Kerry, Brenda, Dawn and Michael, met parishioners informally at a reception in the parish hall. There were many members of their Hamilton congregation here, also, to witness the ceremony.
