# Norval School Survives

Norval and Campbellville schools, the two smallest schools in the county, won their fight for survival Thursday night, when the Halton County Board of Education voted unanimously to keep them open.

Since January the board has been considering the closing of the schools and the transporting of the students to larger schools.

E. M. Lavender, assistant director of Education, told the board the Norval Ratepayer's opinions expressed in their brief, Feb. 2, played a large part in forming the recommendation. He stressed, however, that according to British tradition, elected officials sometimes follow the will of the people in exercising judgement, but frequently do not.

"After all the elected are subject to the will of the people every two years", he remarked.

**NOT HAPPY**

The Norval ratepayers were not elated by the decision, since they had fought for the inclusion of a kindergarten in the school.

At present the kindergarten children are being bused to Glen Williams and Pinewick.

The board's position, according to E. M. Lavender is based on the Department of Education's refusal to grant on any additions if the population growth cannot justify it.

The report showed a cost of \$50,000 to restore the old school house for a kindergarten. This had been suggested by the Norval citizens' Group.

**REVERSED**

In Campbellville, the situation was reversed.

In September 1972, the school will house only kindergarten to Grade 2, while the students from Grades 3-8 will attend Brookville School. For this upcoming year it will remain a Grade 1-8 school.

"A compelling argument" was the way Lavender described the Norval residents' plea for the preservation of the school as the centre of community life. He said the balance has to consider between the improved instruction in a larger school,

against the loss to the community and the extended bus travel.

**ESTABLISH OWN**

Julian Reed, one of the spokesmen for the ratepayers, downcast at the lack of a kindergarten, said if the board does not provide a kindergarten at the school, the parents may pull their children out of the Halton system and establish their own kindergarten in a church basement.

He claimed it would cost the board \$10,000 in grants if the 20 children were withdrawn, but if the board would establish a kindergarten the residents would

supply the extra money needed.

**RENOVATE**

Lavender suggested the old Norval school built in 1853 should be given to the community as a museum or village centre, but Reed told The Herald later, he thought the residents would find the money to renovate it for a kindergarten.

night before leaving home, she thought it would be wise to raise the kitchen window, so it would be cooler when she arrived back home.

When she arrived back 'Ole Ringtail' was sitting on her kitchen table. The coon finally left through the open door.

Personally I will take a beaver. They are mischievous also, only in a different way.

**RAINBOWS DOWN DEEP**

Trout are difficult to catch on the surface in certain spots. They will boil up at the fly, but are hard to hook.

To get good results, I have been using a No. 6 fast-sinking fly, the same one that took nice trout through the ice last winter.

The body is made of peacock herl, with a fine gold tinsel rib. The tail is of strands of black and white tipped wood duck feather; wing is of the same, and the collar hackle is dark with a black center.

Sometimes they take while the fly is sinking, other times they prefer to suck it in as it's coming slowly up past them.

At present it seems to be a sure method, but it's still a mystery because the stomach contents are next to nothing. We always bring home a few and many are returned to the water unharmed.

**THE FABULOUS RED & WHITE LURE**

The devil baits of all sizes, is one of the most productive lures I ever used when I was spin casting.

The fabulous catches of speckled trout taken from Shoo Fly Lake northwest of Capreol were taken mostly on them not just on one trip but on all seven of the different years that I fished there.

One size only was used, the length was 2 1/2 inches. It was the most effective after sundown and as late as 2 a.m.

The lure was let sink to the bottom then retrieved very slowly in an erratic manner.

**GOOD SPECKS**

It also took big speckled trout from Foote Lake 15 minutes flying time from Chapleau, Sheldon Lake, and Trout Lake, north of Bruce Mines also produced good specks taken on the red and white.

The latter two lakes are produced the Linham's.

using trout up to 9 lbs. on flies, especially near the 12th of June when the shad fly hatch is on.

The Red & White is also a fabulous lure for pike and muskies.

It's best used with just a split ring, no swivel.

The price doesn't matter. They range from 25c to \$2.50. The ones I used were the cheap ones with good hooks that were hand honed for good penetration.

So, if you are interested, buy a Red and White, let it sink, retrieve it slow and a tight line you will have.

That's all for now. I'm going fishing. So tight lines, enjoy the outdoors and Safe Journey.
