Laneway Sale Snags Won't Sell for \$3,500

Proposed sale of a 30 foot laneway to Golden Gate Construction Co., was vetoed by council Monday in a stormy session which saw councillors divided on what the town should receive for the property.

The laneway is an integral part of a condominium development at the Mountainview-Campbell Gate corner.
The project, already under construction, was originally planned as town houses by Aler Construction. And some councillors claim that no site plan has ever been approved, nor have condominiums been officially mentioned.

WILLING
Solicitor Monty Hyde spoke for company official Al Pilutti at the meeting, reviewing that council in March had approved a plan to reduce the project from an original 38 units to 36 and to negotiate to sell the laneway, which would be used for parking and playground area.

The firm offered \$2,000, subsequently the town had it appraised at \$3,500, and Golden Gate is willing to pay this.

He said that \$16,000 which councillors claim should be collected is not a liability and has been used unfairly to blacken the firm's name.

HID NOTHING
"Golden Gate has hidden nothing and has brought all its plans here" he said.

Reeve Ric Morrow disputed Mr. Hyde's statement, saying that the town has never signed a site plan agreement.

A building permit was issued in September, 1970, to Aler Investments. The permit was signed by the assistant to the building inspector, and he questions if this is valid, and that it might have expired before construction started.

ONE DIFFERENCE
He criticized Cr. Ern Hyde, as a council representative on the Planning Board, for "having done very little to correct this situation."

Cr. Hyde maintained that the only difference in town houses and condominiums is in the matter of financing.

There has been no change from the original site plan, he said, and if there has been laxity it has not been on the part of the developer.

DEFEATED
Later in the meeting, a Hyde-Levy motion to sell the laneway for \$3,500, was defeated in a 5-3 vote, with only Cr. Sykes lending support.

The motion hit a snag when Cr. Joan Smith said that she had read an appraisal hastily before the council meeting, and that the appraiser has valued the land at \$5,000 to the developer.

Cr. Phil Siddall said that while he supports the development, mistakes have been made by both parties, and that council has not had good advice from the Planning Board.

BETTER PRICE
He wants to enter negotiations for a new agreement, and for the town to keep the laneway unless it can get a better price.

Reeve Ric Morrow said the town's whole revenue for the project is \$907 for a building permit.

"We won't be financially stable if we carry on this way" he said. "We will have a capital loss when 36 new families move in."

HAS A DUTY
Cr. Hyde argued that if the land is not sold, the builder will go back to his original plan and the town will have a laneway which it will have to maintain.

Summing up, Mayor Smith said that while this is the type of building which Georgetown needs, council has a duty to ratepayers to get a proper appraisal and that a site plan agreement for condominiums should be signed.

SIGNED
Council and developer are both responsible for the hassle, he said, recommending a final appraisal before any sale.

Mr. Pilutti told the Herald later that he had signed the site plan agreement some months ago, as submitted to him by the town solicitor.
