Stewarttown, Centennial One - Two in Track Meet

Eight schools participated in the North Halton Field Day held at Ontario School for the Deaf track Wednesday, and boys' and girls' track squads from Stewarttown Public School combined for the overall win.

Foundry's Customers Reads Like Who's Who

The word got around among Ontario sculptors, and now, one by one, they are making their way to the small precision casting foundry under the trees on Mountainview Road in Georgetown.

Dora de Pedery Hunt has had bronze medals cast there. Martin Kastner's strong Brecht masks shown recently at St. Lawrence Centre were finished at the foundry. The list of sculptors who make use of the Georgetown facilities reads like a Who's Who: Gerald Gladstone, Jacobine Jones, Siggy Puchta, Mae Marx, Tony Stapella, A. Kopmanis, Ian Trowell, Ted Bieler, Leonard Osterle, Almuth Lutkenhaus, Haarlander, Barrie Shaw, Rimmington, John Lim, Jose and E.B. Cox.

FINE CASTING
"It's the best thing since high heels," Cox said as he parked his car in front of the white building with the green trim. Mid Canadian Investment Castings Ltd. looks like a village smithy, somehow, with sweating, muscled men pouring molten metal into molds. (The spreading chestnut tree is a willow, but you can hear robins.)
Actually, the seven-year-old

foundry's chief concern is fine casting in stainless steel, bronze and aluminum for industrial objects. It has 30 employees, chiefly Georgetown residents, including 11 women who inspect and clean the waxes, finish and deburr castings.

MAY EXPAND
The increasing patronage of Ontario sculptors and some from Quebec may force the firm to expand, Manager Al Rice admitted. With partners Eric Knoepfel and Barry Rice agreed that separate facilities to cast sculptures may be justified.
"Why shouldn't we have our own industry?" sculptor Cox said. "It's often impractical for a sculptor to go to Belgium or Denmark or New York to have work done, to say nothing of the cost."
CRAFTSMANSHIP
Cox, who drove to Georgetown to pick up his 32-piece chess set, cast in bronze and aluminum, glistened over his tiny finished sculptures. "There's honest clean craftsmanship here."
"We're fascinated that our place is capable of doing fine sculpture," the partners said. "Each sculpture is a problem in itself. It's kind of satisfying to the ego to solve it."
BEAVER
Cox discovered the foundry,

also by word of mouth, when he sculpted some small bronze animals, including the Canadian beaver. From the beaver, the idea of a Canadian historical chess set developed. Cox researched early history and the finished pieces are authentically Canadian.
His king is based on Prince Rupert, first governor of Hudson's Bay Company. The queen is an Indian princess, the castle modelled on Fort Garry. The bishop is a Jesuit priest with a cross. The knight is a courier du bois, kneeling with rifle and coonskin cap and beaver is the pawn.
LIKE IT
"The virtue of cast bronze is that it doesn't have to be unique. And that reduces the cost—increases the profit, however you want to look at it," Cox said. "We need this availability of service. They give you the impression here of not being afraid to do an honest day's work. It's a small town factory with an old-fashioned way of having time to talk to you. Honest craftsmen. Sculptors like that."
