

Halton East Split On Regional Gov't

The people of Halton County remain deeply split over the issue of regional government, according to results of a riding-wide poll released last week by Halton East MPP Jim Snow.

Snow, minister without portfolio reported his survey findings — answered by 3,148 constituents — to a meeting of about 150 members of the Progressive Conservative riding association where he was unanimously acclaimed as the riding's provincial candidate in the soon-expiring Ontario election.

On the issue of regional government, 1,213 were opposed, 1,141 favored the political restructuring and 787 were undecided. When asked if they would favor either a Halton-only regional setup or a Peel-Halton unit, 1,781 favored Halton-only, with 655 votes for Halton-Peel and 604 undecided.

Snow said later he found no surprises in the results. He pointed to the split as evidence that there is still no great consensus on regional government and that the large undecided vote showed that many people "don't understand the complications."

Because of substantial opposition to a proposed Peel-Halton regional setup, the Ontario government has temporarily shelved the idea for this area.

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Noting the overwhelming preference for the Halton-only structure Snow said, "If the plan had been put forward for Halton only, we'd have regional government already."

NOT STALLING
He said regional government would "not necessarily" be a big issue in the up-coming provincial election.

He said the province was not "stalling" on regional government, but acting "the way a proper, thoughtful government would proceed — where it's needed most."

Snow had sent his 14-question survey to 25,000 homes and businesses, and said the 12 per cent response was "well above average" for that type of survey. On the question of the majority age (for voting, drinking and contracts) 1,351 favoured the present age of 21, 1,117 wanted it lowered to 18, and 598 wanted 19-year-olds to have full adult rights.

KEEP POTILLEGAL
Snow said the provincial government is now considering lowering the majority age, and noted that the majority of the questionnaires supported such a measure.

In other questions 2,353 constituents opposed legalization of marijuana with 367 favoring legalization and 329 undecided. An overwhelming majority was against extension of public support for separate schools to Grade 13. The vote was 2,373 against, 629 for and 129 undecided.

The riding survey was the highlight of Snow's acceptance speech.

The nomination itself was uneventful because no one challenged Snow for the candidacy as Halton East MPP and provincial minister without portfolio.

Donald Halford put Snow's name in nomination and his campaign manager Bruce McKinnon promised a vigorous campaign with the slogan of "personal freedom with social justice in a clean environment."

Another PC slogan included the phrases: "STOP SPADINA GO TRANSIT STOP SOCIALISM GO PROGRESSIVE CONSERVATIVE."

SCATHING ATTACK
Also attending the meet were Health Minister A. B. R. Lawrence; Halton West MPP George Kerr, minister of energy and resources; Minister Without Portfolio Richard Potter; Ontario PC Vice-President Bill Thompson and Oakville Reeve Alan Masson.

Lawrence launched a scathing attack on the Liberals and NDP — parties he called "old in opposition."

YOUNG AND DECISIVE
He said the Liberals are "lazy, frightened of the major issues, their stand on the Spadina Expressway issue demonstrating 'no intellectual guts.'"

Lawrence criticized the NDP for its "phoney Canadianism."
