## IN THE MAIL BAG Keep Green Belt Advice from Saigon

Dear Sir: We have been receiving the Georgetown Herald for some time now and thoroughly enjoy it. Also, with a great deal of interest, we have been following the articles, discussions etc. relating to the problem of the town property on Princess Anne Drive — "To sell or not to sell, that is the problem."

We would now like to add our "Two cents worth", even though we have no stake in the outcome

of the Council's decision other than that of interested spectators. In fact, these interested spectators live on the other side of the world, in a town called Saigon, in a country named the Republic of South Vietnam, far removed from Georgetown.

We find it inconceivable that the Council can vote any way other than "No" on the proposition that the land be sold for "development". That beautiful piece of wild, real estate right in the middle of town — how can they even contemplate destroying it? What of the future? Where

can future generations even get a glimpse of nature in its unspoiled state?

Too often in our travels around the world, we have seen this very thing occur. We have lived in many countries and have experienced this first hand — the houses go up and the developers put in a "park" — a couple of swings, a slide or two and a few sad trees, to replace those they have bulldozed away.

Canada is a huge, beautiful country with great expanses of land just waiting to be developed. Why cannot the planners think as big as their country? Why must everything be squeezed together in one neat little congested area? Keep what parkland you have inside your town and benefit from its beauty and its recreation possibilities.

We, here in Saigon, would give anything to be able to wander through the Georgetown Wilder-

ness Area, as we have done many times in the past. Saigon has one area left, this is not roped off with barbed wire and armed guards and that is the Zoo! However, everytime one wished to visit this park, so do the 2,999,999 other Saigonese! Also, one must take heed of the signs — "Do not leave the pathways" — "Beware of mines!"

So, come on Gorgeous Georgetown, think of the present and the future! Think big! Think ecologically!

## Says Report "Waste of Time"

A progress report from the adhoc committee on religious education, filed with Halton County Board of Education on Thursday, was termed "a waste of time" by one of the members of the committee which filed it. Board trustee Noel Cooper said the report by his committee chairman trustee L. D. Palmer was full of "ifs, ands, buts and maybes".

"Come up with some recommendations on religious education and don't beat around the bush with reports like this," he charged the chairman. Palmer replied he was only trying to keep the board informed of his committee's progress.

Another trustee who sits on the same committee, Hubert Clooney, admitted it was a waste of time to file the report but he added, "we are making progress" and hoped in three or four months the committee would have some definite recommendations.

The 25-member committee first met in February and has held eight regular meetings plus several sub-committee meetings. Two sub-committees were formed, one to investigate moral development from kindergarten to grade 13 and prepare a curriculum, the other to investigate resource materials and films for a course on world religions as a credit course.

During the half hour discussion it was noted opening exercises are not being held in some of the schools, and it was feared some of the teachers were not having their classes recite the Lord's Prayer each day because it has recently been omitted from its regular place at the front of the daily class register. The opening exercises were drawn up in 1944 and some parts were revised in the early 1960's.

Assistant to the director of education Em. Lavender suggested it was "not some sinister plot" that the prayer was not being printed... "maybe the government was on an economy drive."
