**CONCRETE GRAVEL**

Crack one egg in a pan long enough to take a 15 inch trout. Season (after beating) with salt and pepper, onion salt, garlic salt, and celery flakes. Dip trout (both sides) and spoon some of the flavoured batter into the cavity, roll in fine cracker crumbs and place in iron frying pan that has Mazola oil or olive oil heated to proper temperature. Be sure and cut the head and tail off the trout so they will fit the pan better.

A 13 inch trout cooked between medium and low temperature should be done quite well if left on each side for 15 to 17 minutes.

They go good with fresh sliced tomatoes and homefries.

For a liquid seasoning I like the works, grapefruit sliced, lemon juice, or lemon slices, vinegar and a little ketchup on the side.

Smaller pan sized speckled trout are done the same way only not left so long each side to cook.

Try my way some time and you will be in for a treat.

I might add that fillets of muskie, pike, bass, pickerel, whole perch, and smelts were also cooked the same way.

So if you don't have trout try cooking your favourite species my way. If you don't like them don't bother to tell me because I will probably tell you that you just didn't do it right.
