### Damage \$1,000 Glen Accident

A single car accident on the 9th line in Glen Williams, July 15, caused \$1,000 damage to a '66 Mustang driven by Glen Tailfefer, R. R. Acton. \$600 damage to one car and no damage to the other, was the unusual result of a collision opposite the Georgetown Golf Club, July 18. The '65 Chev. driven by John Beecham, R.R.4 Georgetown, was undamaged, but the '71 Pontiac convertible driven by Roderigo Tavares, of Georgetown, received \$600 damage. Also on July 18, a rear end collision on the old Norval station road, one mile west of Terra Cotta, caused a total of \$100 damage. \$150 damage was done to the '67 Chev driven by Ronnie Post of Brampton, and \$300 damage to the '67 Ford driven by Romaine Vlaendern of Rexdale. 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### Silvercreek Park May be Reforested

The triangular piece of land at the junction of highway 7 and the 7th line, which has been a roadside picnic area for some years, may revert to a reforestation project, if no one shows interest in keeping it as a park. Reeve Tom Hill told Esqueusing council Monday that the county had been asked by the Department of Highways, if they wanted the park, otherwise it would revert to the township. The reeve guessed it would cost between \$1000 and \$1,500 a year to maintain. He suggested the area be left with the Department of Highways, and trees be planted on it. The park originally was accessible from highway 7, but alterations at the Silvercreek curve make it accessible only from the 7th line, going toward Ballinafad.

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
