

"Itching to Take on Jim Snow"

Gelok is New Democratic Choice

A 26 year old union executive who says he represents "the ordinary struggling, sensible people" will carry the Halton East New Democratic Party banner in the next provincial election.

Ken Gelok July 13 defeated Brian Thrippleton by a narrow 32-24 nomination vote in Milton's U.A.W. Hall. It was a victory for the unionist Gelok over the academic Thrippleton who is head of the history department at White Oaks High School.

SOLID SUPPORT

Thrippleton had received solid support from the youth wing of the Halton East riding association, many of whom were former students.

But one delegate later said it was Gelok's experience within the NDP and popularity throughout the riding that spelled his victory over Thrippleton, a late entry in the race.

Gelok said later that the close vote would in no way divide the NDP who expect the next provincial election in mid-September.

"It certainly doesn't create any division at all within the NDP," he said adding that Thrippleton will be a member of his campaign committee.

ELECTION FIGHT

The new candidate sees the upcoming election battle as a direct contest between the NDP and the Conservatives, with the Liberals on the periphery. "I'm itching to take on Jim Snow," Gelok proclaimed.

The hat was passed around and \$75.60 in campaign funds was contributed.

It was Gelok's second nomination convention this year. In February, he had been defeated by William Gillies who later was forced to withdraw from politics because of "personal setbacks."

Gelok had been Gillies' campaign manager and has a history of involvement in the labour movement.

OILWORKERS

He is executive vice president of the Oil Chemical, and Atomic workers union in

Mississauga where he works for the Gulf refinery. He is also an executive on the Oakville District Labour Council.

An alumnus of Holland, he came to Canada as a boy, moving to Oakville in 1960 where he graduated from Oakville-Trafalgar High School, "and then I went right out to work."

"People are our priority," Gelok told the delegates, stressing that the New Democratic Party represents "common people fighting for common causes."

SOCIALIST BELIEFS

Gelok has no hesitancy in declaring his socialist beliefs and opposition to the "evil philosophy" of capitalism.

"We are attacking the free enterprise system," he said.

Promising a vigorous door-to-door canvassing campaign with the stress on the NDP's "honest straightforward" approach, Gelok pointed to the recent NDP victory in Brant riding and new socialist governments in Saskatchewan and Manitoba as "forerunners of things to come in this province."

"The NDP has never been closer to power in Ontario than now."

He is married and has two boys aged six and three.

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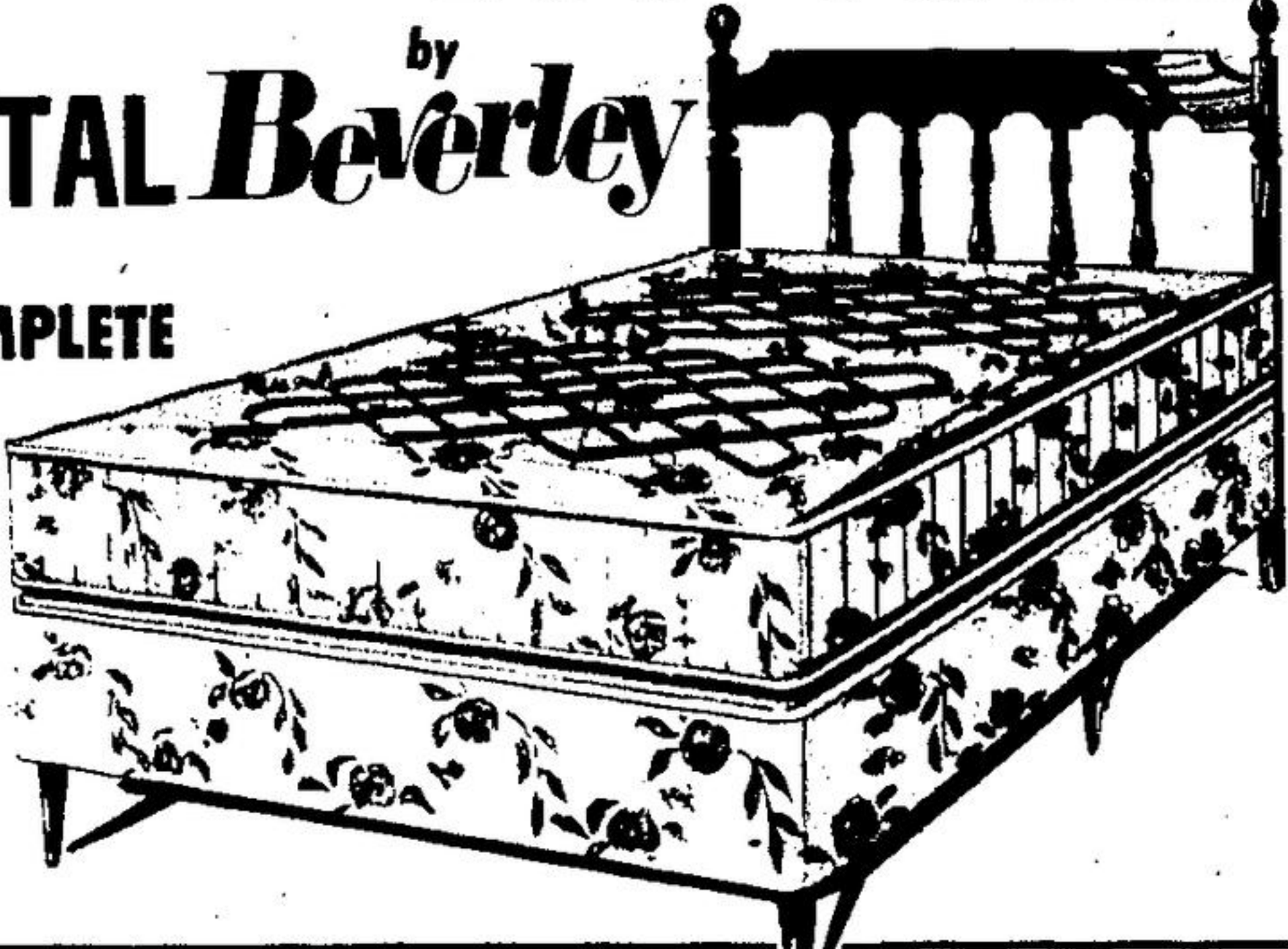

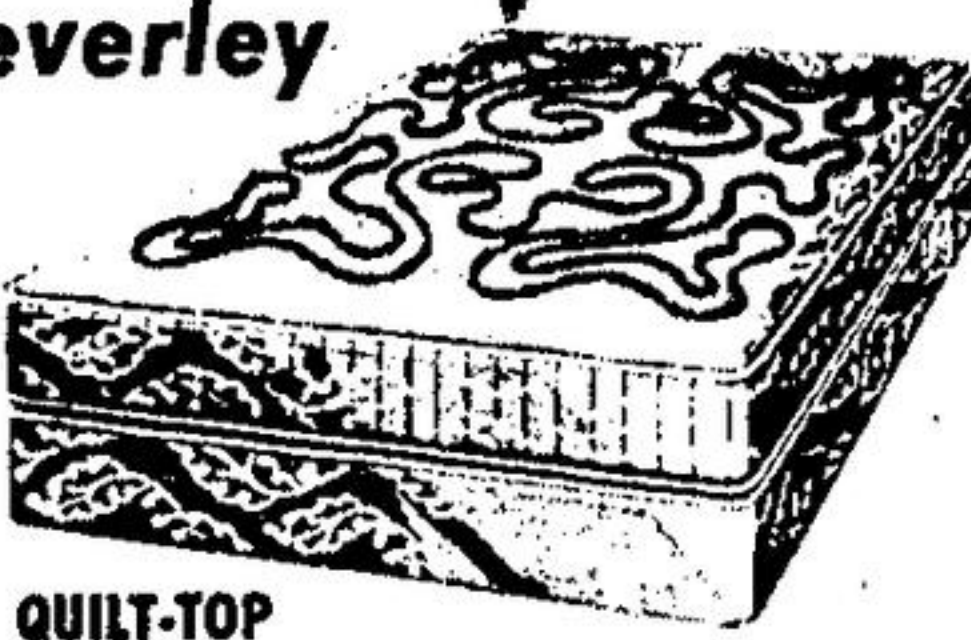


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
