## 'Too Zealous?' Queries Loitering Enforcement

A Georgetown councillor is concerned about the town's anti-loitering by-law.

At a Monday committee meeting, Cr. Phil Siddall said that a resident, Mrs. Laura Quambury, may have a point in a letter she addressed to council recently.

Mrs. Quambury claimed the by-law could turn Main Street into a 'ghost town' with shoppers being told to move on. She said young people say they hate Georgetown and made a plea for the police to 'get on the side of youth.'

Mr. Siddall said he is bothered by the explicit wording of the by-law, quoting sections which say 'no person shall lounge, loaf, to obstruct use of public sidewalks.'

He said it would seem an undue amount of zeal is being applied to enforcing the by-law.

Cr. Donna Denison said the Criminal Code has two sections which have the same effect as the by-law.

One deals with obstruction by a crowd and one with using obscene language.

Cr. Siddall suggested the town solicitor be asked for an opinion on whether loitering is covered in existing laws, and does not need a special local by-law.

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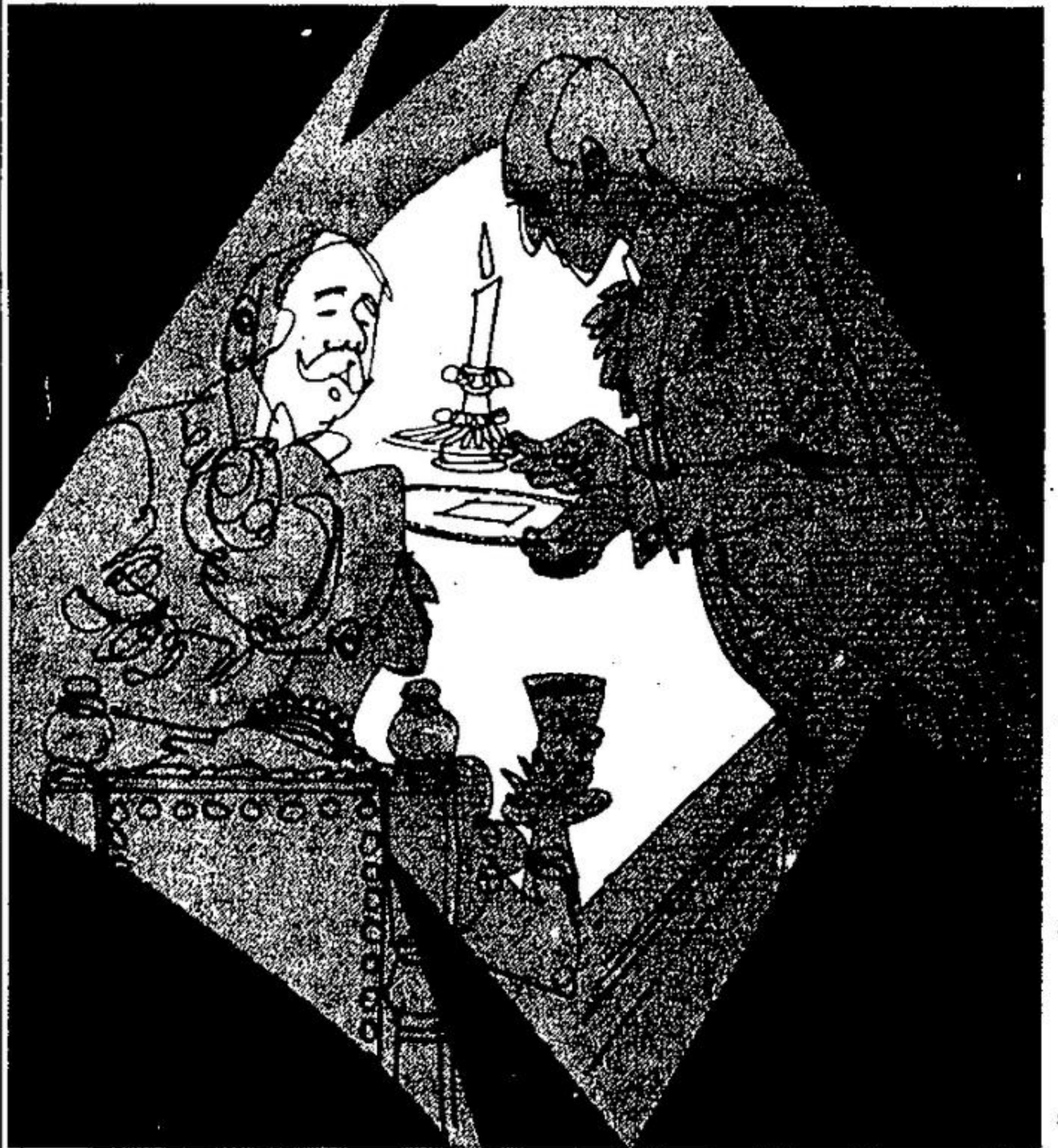

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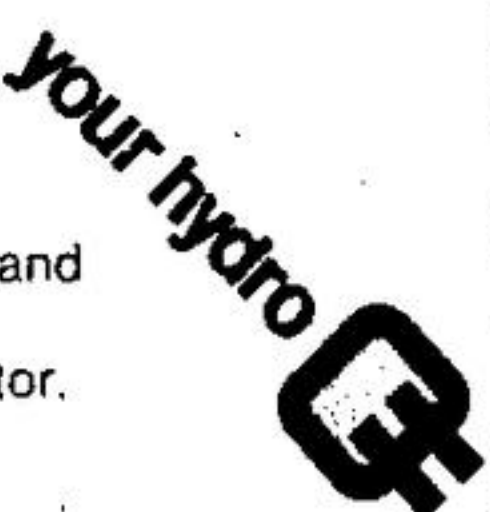
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
