Halton County Warden Dr. F.G. Oakes will soon have a classier office. At a committee meeting of county council last week councillors agreed to seek a second price on the contract for the redecorating job.

The first price came in at \$1,469 for walnut panelling and baseboard. The Warden recently moved his office across the hall to the room formerly used as a committee room, in the Halton Administration Building in Milton.

### Escapes Injury In Embankment Plunge

Missing the stop sign at the 7th line and highway 7, early in the morning, July 22, cost Jack Osborne, of Oakville, \$750. Coming off the 7th line, he went right across the highway and over the embankment. He escaped injury, but his '64 Volvo received \$750 damage.

A total of \$1,500 damage was done in a collision on the Esquesing-Nassagaweya town line, July 28, when a '68 Mercury driven by William Pleshe of Whitby, collided with a '65 Volkswagen, driven by Tyrone Wilinsky of Toronto.

The Mercury received \$1,000 damage and the Volkswagen \$500.

### Esqueing Council Briefs

Esqueing council endorsed a resolution Monday passed by Georgetown council, asking the Minister of Municipal Affairs, to ignore a recommendation from Ontario Municipal Association, which would allow anyone qualified to run for office in one municipality to run in any other municipality in Ontario. They also wanted the second recommendation ignored, this is to abolish the mandatory payment of taxes before a candidate can run for office.

Council heard a letter from Charles Hildebrandt, complaining of the noise of the loudspeakers at the Toronto International Dragway.

Council received a vote of thanks from Glen Williams Minor Softball executive for their financial support for the year.

They were also invited to attend the official opening of the new addition to the A. R. C. Industries building in Hornby, September 11.

A building permit was issued to Mrs. Dawn Thompson for lot 16, Con. 8, with the stipulation only one permit would be issued for the land, and no more separations would be allowed. Council emphasized that the permit was issued because the Planning Board had approved the separation in 1965.

### Want Light Stop Sign After Accident

Milton Heights residents are seeking a three way stop sign and a caution light at the town line and the 3rd line, near Kelso Conservation Authority.

Jack Zanatta presented a petition to Esqueing council Monday, signed by almost all the residents asking for them, plus an additional request for street lights. A bad accident Saturday, when 12 people were hurt at this intersection prompted the petition.

Reeve Tom Hill said the three way sign and the caution light would be looked after, but it would be necessary to consult with Nassagaweya about the street lights since the road is the boundary.

Clerk Delmar French asked Zanatta to find someone to point out to the Hydro, the spots the street lights are needed.

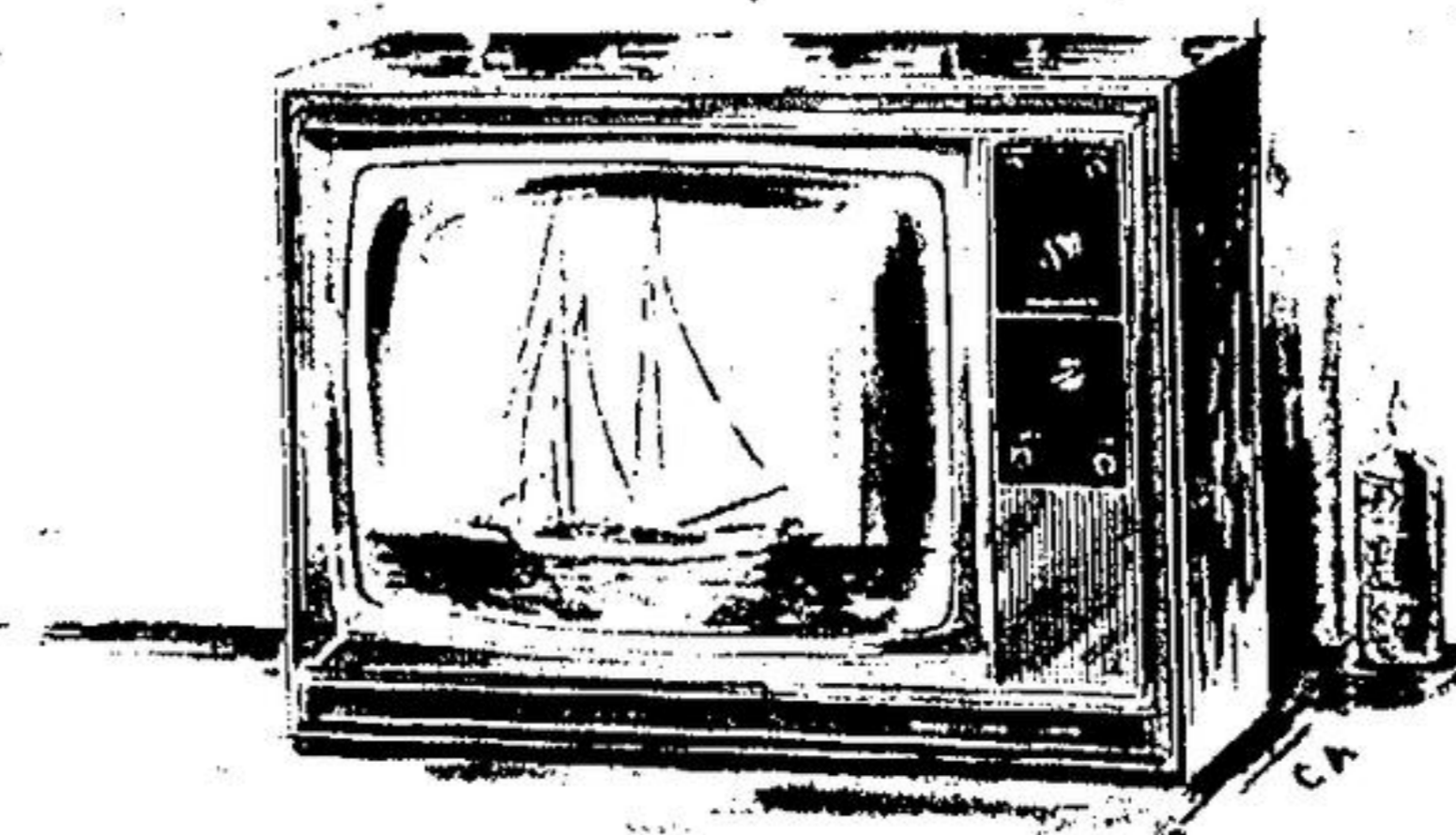
### Stove and Supper Fire Casualties

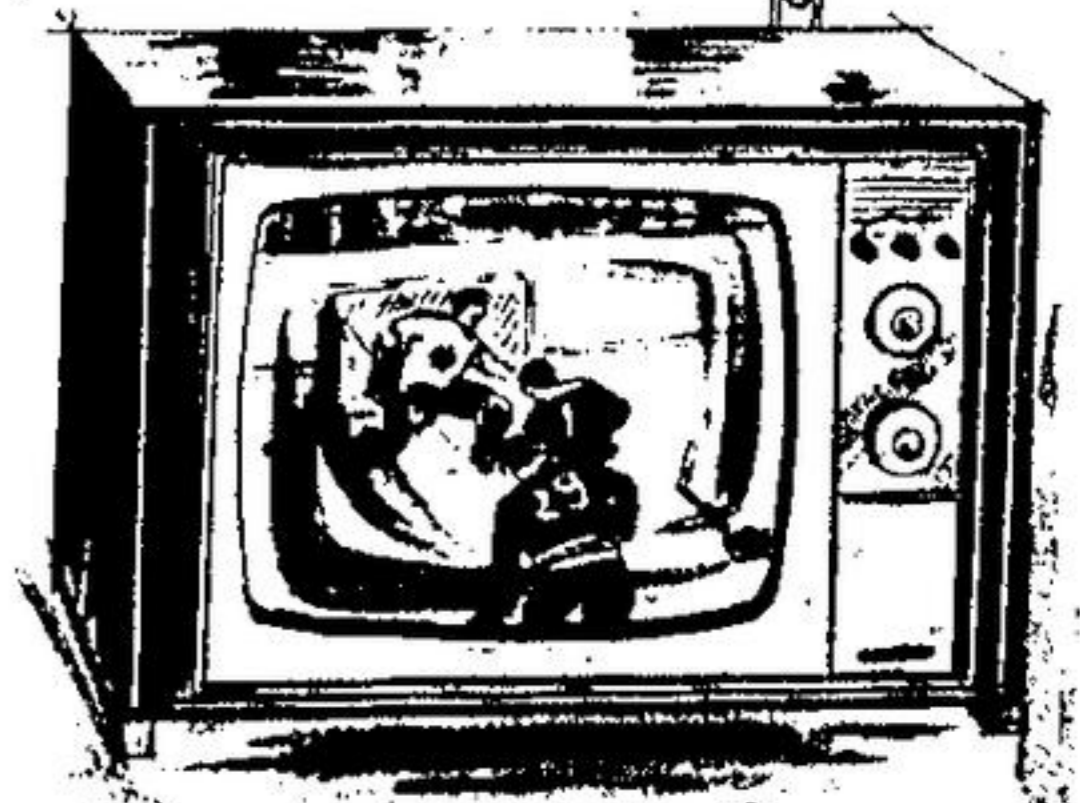

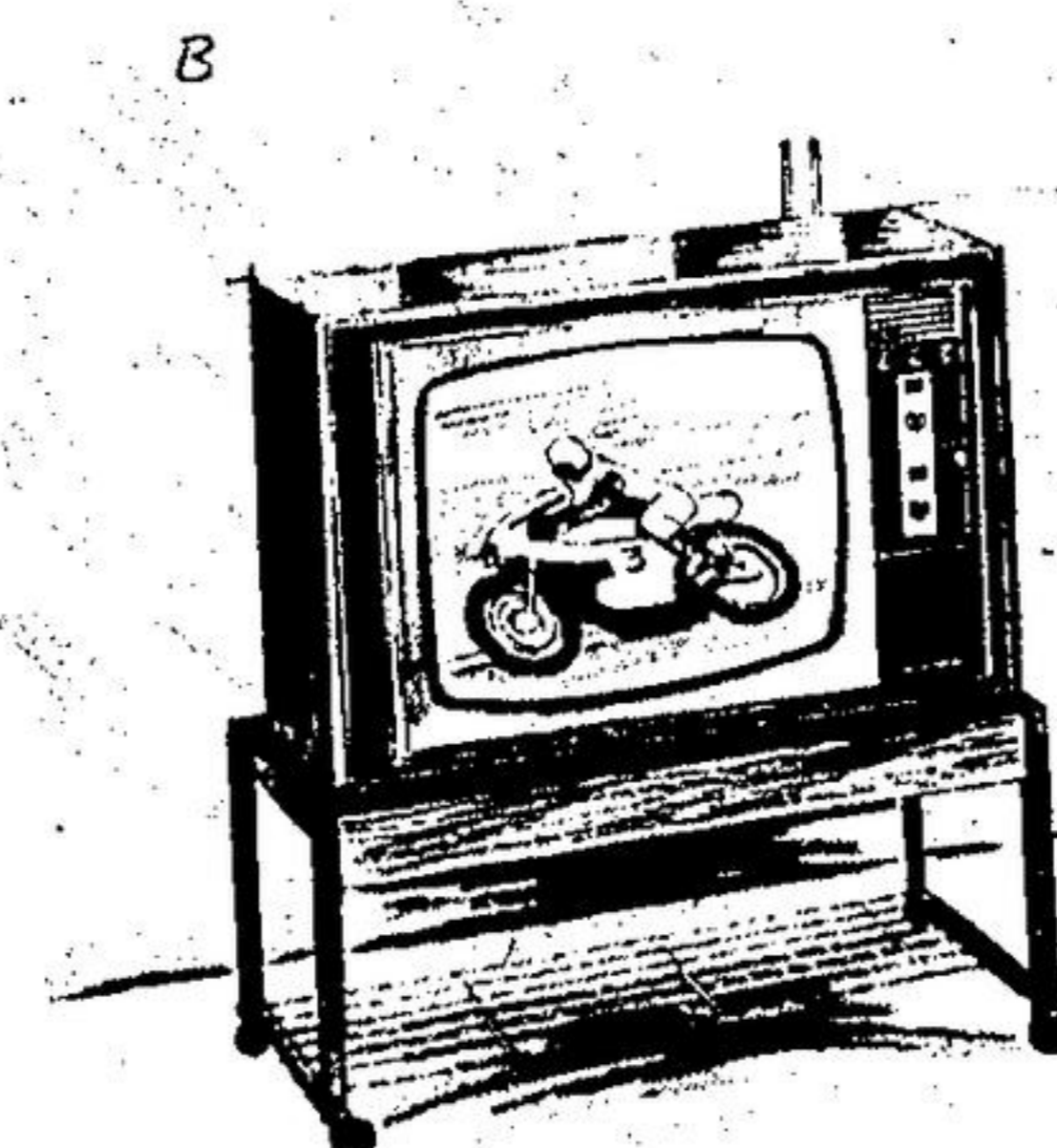

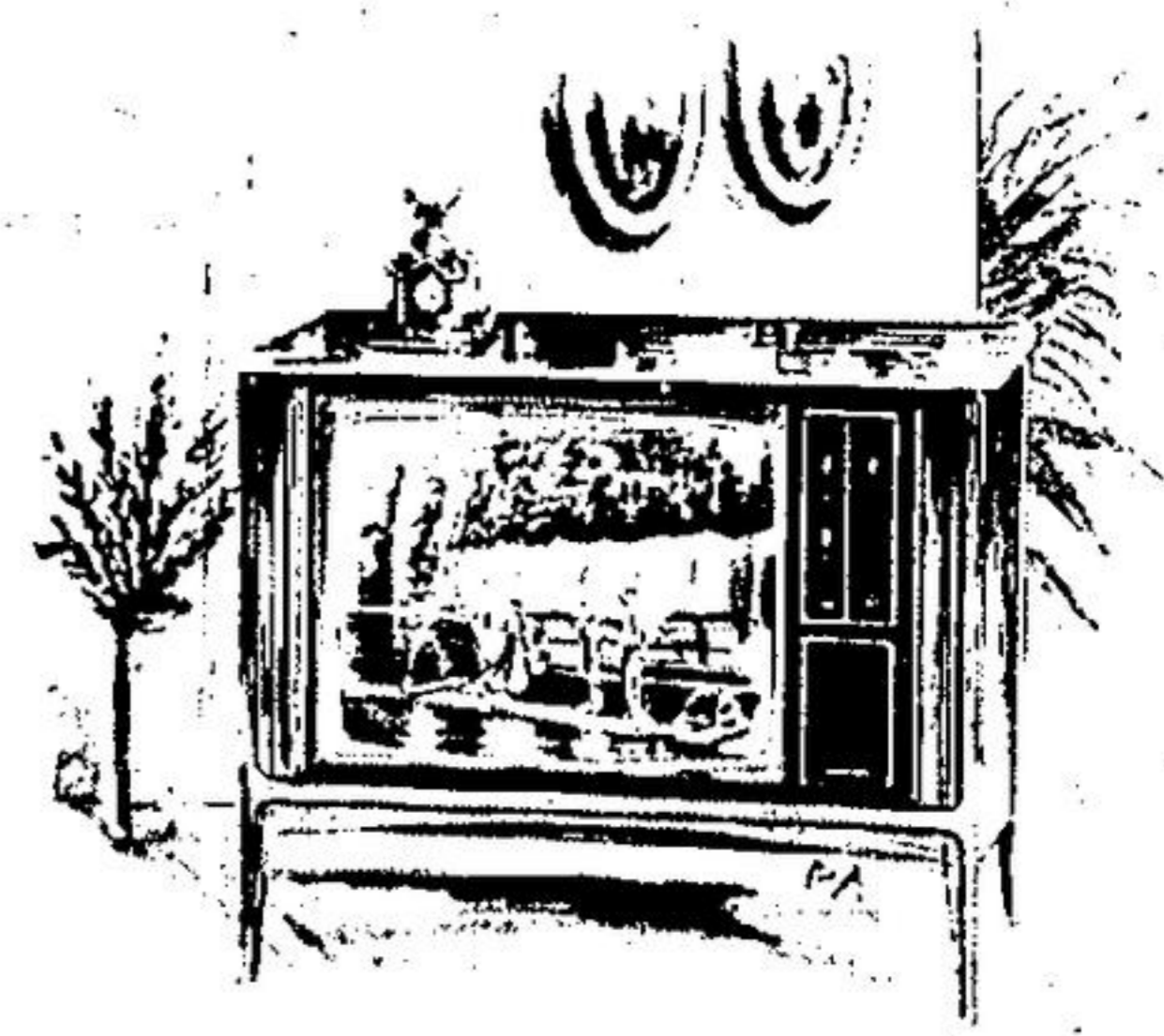
