## Residents Win, Lowville Road Will Stay Scenic

Plans for a straight high-speed road through the scenic hamlet of Lowville, were vetoed by Halton County Council, on July 20, ending a three year battle by most of the residents to keep the village as it is.

The rejection by county council followed a plea by Burlington Reeve David Coons to "leave the Lowville road alone". He said people don't want the road cutting through their village, and urged instead only minor repairs to the road and road shoulders.

Mrs. Ella Foote, Burlington Ward 3 councillor, appeared before county council asking them to abandon the scheme.

The plan to re-route the Guelph Line through the western fringe of the settlement of several hundred people has been under consideration for several years, with the cost estimated at \$500,000.

The engineering study, completed last year, cost \$54,000 and listed four alternative routes.

One of the four bypass routes, referred to as "Scheme D", was approved by last year's county road committee, and narrowly passed county council.

But the issue was reopened this year by chairman of roads, Reeve James Swanborough, of Burlington, who said some Lowville residents felt they were denied a full hearing.

Despite a public meeting in Lowville last month, at which many of the 65 residents protested any change in the road, the roads committee recommended adoption of "Scheme D".

Council turned down the road committee's recommendation 9 to 3, in a seldom-seen reversal of a previous council's decision.

Charles Evans Hughes, a Supreme Court Justice, resigned to become a candidate for the presidency and later became a secretary of state.

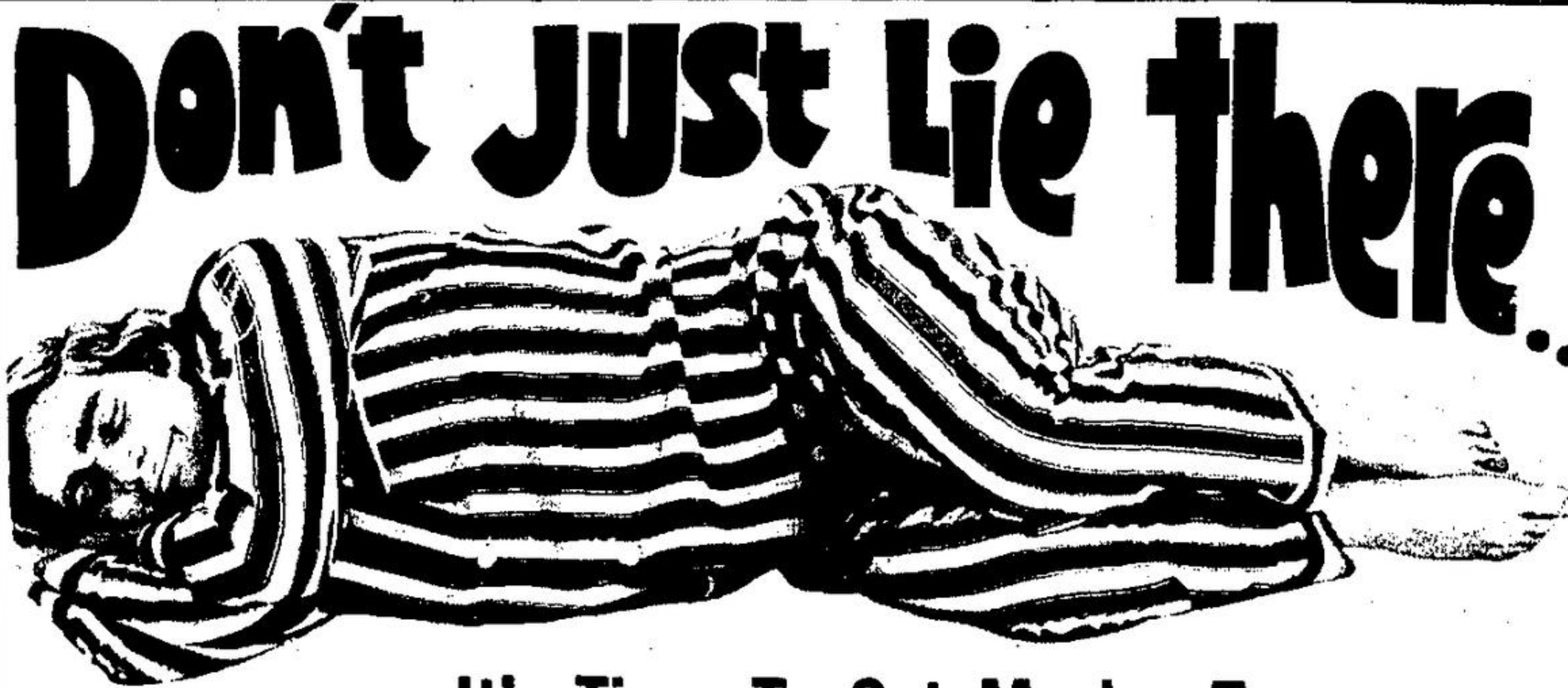
