## NORTH HALTON REPORT

The week ending July 24, officers of the Ontario Provincial Police stationed at Milton Detachment worked a total of 995 1/2 hours and travelled 9,236 miles patrolling roads in their area. There were 50 drivers summoned to appear in Court for traffic violations and an additional 49 motorists received warnings. Proceedings in Provincial Court in Milton resulted in 51 convictions.

During the 7 day reporting period officers were involved in investigating 65 general occurrences. Included in this

number were: 3 thefts, 3 break and enters, 4 investigations under the Liquor Control Act which resulted in 4 persons being charged, there was a vehicle reported stolen which was later recovered, an additional 5 vehicles were recovered for other police departments, 2 persons were reported missing and later located, 1 trespassing complaint, 3 persons were charged with impaired driving and investigation is continuing where an area storekeeper received a counterfeit bill. The remaining occurrences were of a

minor nature. Sixteen collisions were investigated this week. Ten of these collisions resulted in property damage only while the remaining 6 caused personal injury to 18 persons. Total property damage arising from these collisions was estimated to be \$11,360.00. Causes of these collisions were attributed to: inattentive driving, dangerous driving, follow too closely, fail to yield and improper turns. Ten drivers have been charged as a result of these collisions.

## County Student's Marks Among Ontario Tops

Halton County's top high school student, 18-year-old Maurice Juneau, of Burlington, was the sixth best in Ontario, according to a computer at Queen's Park.

The computer tabulated the marks of all 50,000 students writing Grade 13 examinations this year and picked Joyce Lu of Ottawa to head the list with 98 per cent.

Juneau, a student at Aldershot High School in Burlington scored 97.1 per cent in seven papers to head the county and finish sixth across the province.

Officials of the department of education however pointed out students this year did not write

identical exams as in past years. Juneau, who won a \$4,000 scholarship to McMaster University, scored 100 in two math papers and 99 in a third. His lowest mark was 91 in chemistry.
