Steak Bar-b-Que Nite Jim Snow Sees No Youthful Backlash

If anyone at the Halton East Young Progressive Conservative Bar-B-Que had any inside information about the provincial election date, he wasn't saying.

Friday night's outing at the R.R.3 Georgetown home of Jim Snow, MPP for Halton East, was for steak and swimming, dancing and socializing, not serious political announcements. But since it was essentially a gathering of young Conservatives, there was some discussion of the possible impact of the under-21 vote on the party and the province.

YOUNG PEOPLE

Snow said the Conservatives have always had programs for young people, but that the voting change will have the effects of bringing more of the young into the party and of strengthening already existing youth programs.

"Lack of the vote made the under 21's less interested in politics," he said. He now expects them to be considerably more interested in the political process.

NO BACKLASH

He doesn't believe there will be any youthful backlash at the provincial government's decision requiring college students to vote in their home, rather than their student ridings.

"No other group of people has a choice in where they'll vote in an election," he said.

He also said that the decision was definitely not an attempt to diffuse any concentrations of anti-government feeling that might be found on college campuses.

Cedar Springs Plans Camp, Cocktail Lounge

When Esqueving Township electors go to the polls in 1972 they will likely have a liquor ballot to mark.

Charles LeVigne who operates Cedar Springs Motel on Highway 7, west of Georgetown, attended Monday's Esqueving council meeting seeking permission for some changes to his property including the addition of a cocktail lounge. His request was the first step in procedures leading up to a plebiscite.

Esqueving council will have their lawyer examine another request of LeVigne's which would convert part of his property to a trailer park.

The township has already designated property behind the motel as an acceptable site for a trailer park, but the property owner prefers to locate it on a newly acquired parcel of land just west of the motel. This would mean a change in the by-law.
