### Steelhead Fishing It's a Way of Life In the Northwest

Ken McLeod, noted Northwest conservationist and fishing authority, has this to say about the sea-run rainbow.

Imagine hooking into a lusty, silvery trout as long as your arm - one that is capable of leaping twice as high as the world high-jumping record of seven feet plus, or approaching the record broad jump of 27 feet.

Preposterous? Not in the least when you're talking about the North Pacific's great sea-going rainbow - the incomparable steelhead.

There's an official record of one that fell back onto an 11-foot high platform erected beside a waterfall, after it had missed its mark. It can leap into the crest of a falls 15 feet in height. I personally saw a frantic 20 pound female on the Kispiox River catapult more than 20 feet from where she left the water while clearing easily a jumble of tree roots that reached 3 feet above the river's surface.

Except for a dozen prodigious leaps after feeling the sting of a No. 1-0 wet fly, she was on a 600 yd. rampage straight down stream, apparently bent only on getting back to the Pacific Ocean 200 miles distant.

Of course, there may be exceptions. But every steelhead hooked - from 5 to 30 lbs. is potentially capable of similar feats of piscatorial magic. The great majority give even the most blasé steelheader thrills aplenty for one never knows what will happen next.

#### WAY OF LIFE

Rainbow trout fishing is also a way of life for many people in Ontario. Approximately 1 month from now, they should once again be in our rivers and harbours.

Some of the places to keep in mind are Nottawasaga Bay, good catches of clean non-spawning fighting rainbows are to be had at Meaford in the rivers there and the harbour, also at Owen Sound, Thornbury, along the shore at Craigleith Park, Collingwood is another good bet. The big Saugueen over Southampton way is also choice water, don't be at all surprised if big Coho are on the prowl especially in the Saugueen because like the Nottawasaga it's more of a jack-pot river than most.

So go prepared for anything. Oh yes, and even if you don't fish, take a trip anyway, it's beautiful in the fall and be sure your camera is handy.

One other thing regarding fall rainbow fishing. Be sure and consult the Fishing Regulations pamphlet regarding boundary lines on rivers, and closed waters.

This will have to be it for this week.
