Says Yard Owners Should be Consulted

Doug Watson, who operates a wrecking yard on the 6th Line, told the Herald he felt there were some misleading statements in a recent news item, following a Esquering township council meeting.

While the Herald article did not say any licenses for wrecking yards were under suspension he felt it created that impression. All the licenses for the six wrecking yards in the township, (all the yards in the township), are presently valid, but the township had warned some may not be renewed if all conditions are not met by January 1972, when the licenses come up for renewal.

Despite the fact Watson himself does have a fence surrounding his property which conforms to the bylaw, he questioned the 8' fence stipulation. "We buy buses 12 ft. high for wrecking, so how could we keep the height of the salvage inside the fence below the 8' level", he asked. He pointed out he also has a 40' crane. "There is no way I can hide that behind a fence", he commented.

He suggested wrecking yard owners be consulted when a by-law is being considered, so a workable practical by-law would result.

Forgetting the car keys — dashed back in the house with the lightning showing the way, got the keys and ran again for the car — scared stiff — closed the windows and headed back for the house when a terrific clap of thunder and a wild flash of lightning made me jump — I was running before my feet ever hit the ground.
