## Clergy Comment

Successful helping by individuals, by churches, by helping agencies and by nations is absolutely necessary for the survival of the human race. Helping others is one of the basic concepts of our Christian faith. At first thought it may seem that helping is a simple thing, but in fact helping another is one of the most difficult tasks facing a person. I would go so far as to say that not only do most of our attempts to help fail, they actually are harmful. My point is made clear when we consider how difficult it is to help a neighbour who may be in financial trouble. That person's pride, sense of independence and sense of self worth all must be taken into account. Now consider helping a person or a family or a group of people in another country where language, cultural, religious, historical and political barriers make our understanding of that person's real needs almost impossible.

We all know the blunders that have been made in our dealings with our Canadian Indians. It is a complicated problem, but I believe the basic difficulty lies in the fact that we have attempted to impose our standards and our values upon them, rather than give help on their terms. We often hear of third generation welfare people and wonder how people can continue to be so lazy, but when a person's spirit is broken it takes more than a welfare cheque to repair it.

How often have you heard criticism and doubts about the way our money is spent on international assistance? It grieves me to know that much of this criticism is based on fact, because it is true that some of our money is wasted or unwisely used, not by crooks or imbeciles but by self sacrificing, well intentioned, but uninformed people.

My answer to this problem is not to give up or stop helping others, for this would be disastrous both for them and us. No, my answer is that along with our compassion and desire to help, we must also have the knowledge of how to help. There is, what might be called a science of helping, and to clarify what I mean let me make the following points.

First, people need help (and in many cases, professional help) which is so because we are a social people and depend on each other for survival. This is not a sign of weakness, but rather of our humanness.

Secondly, help must take place within a relationship. The helper must know the recipient as a person, so his real needs can be understood. The recipient must also know the helper so fears and prejudices and other barriers can be broken down. This is why it is necessary to have missionaries and foreign aid workers living more or less permanently in other countries so that the more basic needs and not just the more obvious physical needs may be alleviated. Let us also remember that giving is not a one-way street. When we work with others within a relationship we too are enriched by their gifts.

My third point is that help is very difficult to take. The recipient must be willing to admit that his present way of life is inadequate and that change is necessary. But people hesitate to give up the known for the unknown. Careful research, experimental plots, and almost 100 percent assurance of success are necessary before new practices will be accepted.

And fourthly, if help is to be real, it must be within a free choice situation. If the person is able to say, "yes" he must also be able to say, "no" and have the right to do so. This is often frustrating for the helping agency because, "this new method is obviously far superior to the old way", but it is not obvious until the person accepts it by his own free will.

"Help one another and so fulfill the law of Christ", but my appeal is that we help wisely, that we give to those organizations which are not only governed by compassion but also wisdom and a knowledge of the science of helping.
