Library Has Movies to Lend

Movies, all kinds, from the old silent flickers with Laurel and Hardy, Buster Keaton, Lillian Gish, to modern day films such as Jacques Cousteau, are available at the Georgetown library.

Hundreds of 16 m.m. movies of all kinds, adventure, Audubon wildlife series, historical, comedies, artists and sculptors, cartoons, are there for the private individual or for groups and clubs.

The catalogue listing the films is in the library now, and two weeks notice should be given to ensure delivery here. Effort will be made to fulfill any requests

not listed in the catalogue.

PROJECTOR
