And "Environmental Crisis"

Halton Education Board Approves Canadian Studies

Canadian studies and a course called "Man's Environmental Crisis" won approval from the Halton County Board of Education at the first meeting of the new school term.

The courses were outlined by the social science program council and displays were set up in the rear of the board meeting room to illustrate some of the teaching techniques.

The Canadian studies program will be a broadening of the current Grade 7 and 8 Canadian history courses using "multi-media kits" assembled by the program council.

AUDIO-VISUAL. The kits include use of audio-visual teaching aids and non-textbook pamphlets and other publications.

At the seat of the broadened study course is an effort by the

history committee to improve what it terms insufficient and neglectful teaching of Canadian studies.

FIVE TOPICS The five topics for which kits have been assembled are listed: People on the Move; People and the Canadian North; People and Leisure; People and Conflict, and People and Work.

The school board adopted the program council's recommendation to make the multi-media kits available as models for teachers to develop Canadian studies programs.

The geography subject council got a board okay for its "environmental crisis" study course. But it also received lavish praise from provincial environment minister George Kerr, who is also Halton west MPP.

Kerr, in a letter to the subject council, said socio-economic issues must be understood before pollution problems. Kerr asked permission to show the geography study proposal to the minister of education.
