

70 TENNIS PLAYERS VIED FOR 7 TITLES

Georgetown Tennis Club recently held a tournament on the Joseph Gibbons Park court with seven classes open for entry. Over 70 people participated. The first rounds of this knock-out competition were played on Saturday August 28 and Sunday 29. These were then followed through and the courts were in use every night except Friday of the following week. All games were officially umpired and had linesmen in attendance. As Labour Day weekend approached it was decided to hold the finals on the weekend of September 11th and the courts were filled during the preceding week by practising finalists. These were all double matches to involve more people in a shorter time. Next year singles tour-

naments may be started. The results of the finals are given below and every game was very well attended. Lions Club president Eric Hooten presented the prizes, Simpsons Gift vouchers, to the 14 winners. Mark Mitchell and Denise Thompson, although both Juniors by age, fought their way through the Senior Mixed to lose in the semi-finals. Helga Massar and Denise Thompson again both Juniors, because of insufficient enrolment of Juniors entered in the Ladies' Novice but were eventually beaten in the finals. **GREAT PROMISE** All the preliminary rounds were played on the basis of one set.
