## Stagnation

### Recommend Mark Time On Replacing EMO Chief

Some of Halton County's Emergency Measures Organization volunteers haven't had their uniforms in more than two years.

Allan Masson told the county council's finance committee last week that "some of them have added an inch or two and couldn't get them on if they tried."

The last time the Halton EMO was called on was several years ago when 2,500 Boy Scouts were flooded out of their campsites in North Halton. Since then the EMO has stagnated.

The full-time EMO coordinator, Bruce McGregor, quit his \$10,000 a year position in July.

**KEEN**  
Garfield Brown, county administrator, said McGregor had been very "keen" but the organization stagnated without direction from federal or provincial officials.

At Brown's suggestion, the finance committee recommended the position be left open until the future of the organization is decided. Brown said a federal white paper on emergency measures organizations is expected later this month.

## APATHY

Brown said it has been suggested that the decay of the EMO could be traced to public apathy towards the organization as well as lack of direction from both the provincial and federal governments.

The EMO municipal committee said in a recent report that "the organization is of generally poor quality provincially," and Halton's situation is not unusual.
