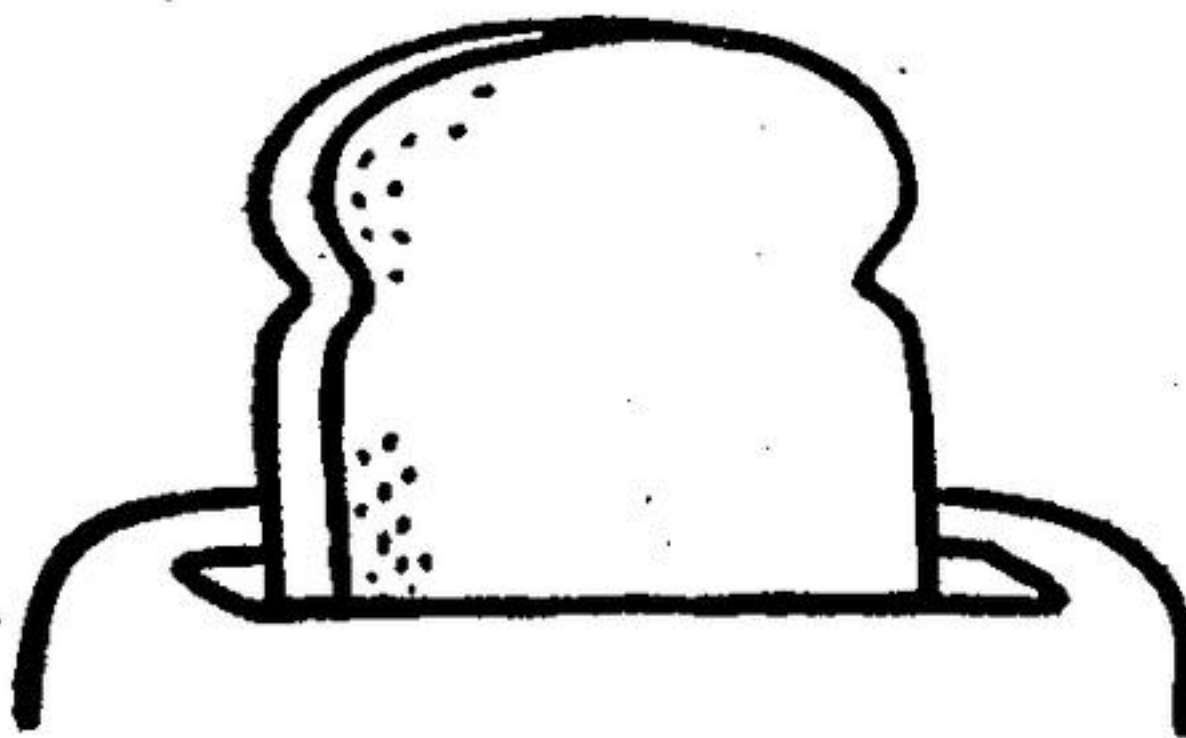

## Dog Catcher Knocks \$500 Off First Offer

George Herrington, the present dog control officer for Esqueing, appeared before Township council, last Tuesday night, repeating his offer made the week before, to continue the service in Esqueing. He had originally planned to resign at the end of September.

At present, Esqueing pays him \$200 a month, plus \$7 for every dog picked up, as long as the pick up is authorized by the township clerk.

The offer made by Herrington to Esqueing now puts the cost at \$4000 a year, (\$500 less than last week's statement), with no \$7 pick-up charge to the township. Herrington said he could reduce

the offer by the \$500 because he doesn't have to buy land, but will extend his facilities at the back of his property.

**THREE DAY**  
The ratepayers will still have to pay \$7 to reclaim their dog, thus paying for the three day mandatory stay at the pound.

Herrington said there would be two men on duty till 9 p.m. and another answering emergency calls. There would be a 24 hour answering service, but this does not mean the dog control officer would come out all through the night, only if the answering service deemed it an emergency. He pointed out he was installing electronic equipment for

the disposal of dogs whose owners did not want them to go to the University of Toronto for research.

**ONE OF SEVEN**  
Herrington surprised council when he said only 1 out of 7 dogs are reclaimed by their owners. When he was asked if he sold any dogs, Herrington said he never had but he had given them away many times, rather than have them destroyed.

Cr. Len Coxie wondered if it was fair to charge 50 cents per capita, over the whole township, when only the four villages of Stewarttown, Limehouse, Norval and Glen Williams were patrolled. He admitted the moral

people would not want their dogs picked up if they followed the cattle from one field to another if it happened to be across the road.

**BETTER**  
Herrington pointed out they would only have to call him if dogs were being a nuisance, then he would pick the dog up whether or not it was in a village.

Deputy-reeve Russell Miller commented, "I think we'll get better service this way".

Council decided to discuss it in committee. The offer is conditional on the three municipalities of Acton, Georgetown and Esqueing sharing in the contract.
