Accept Bid for Second Project

Scotch Block Dam Opens Today

While one project of the Halton County Conservation Authority is being officially opened today, the tender for the newest project has just been accepted.

Last week, the Authority voted in favor of accepting the bid of Alnor Earth Moving Ltd. of Oshawa, for construction of the Hilton Falls Dam.

The tender, \$1,000 under the estimated cost of the project, was for \$790,559.

IN NASSAGAWEYA
The reservoir created by the dam will be located in Nassagaweya Township, in North Halton.

The dam construction will begin almost immediately, and will be in two phases, with

completion scheduled for next October.

Ann MacArthur, representing Nassagaweya on the Authority, said the "Nassagaweya Council is far from happy with conservation" because they have not been fully informed of the Hilton Falls project.

ANSWER QUESTIONS
To remedy the problem with the Nassagaweya council, members of the Authority will appear before the council to answer all questions about the Hilton Falls project.

Scotch Block Dam, west of here on Highway 25, will be officially opened today.

It will be a closed ceremony, marking the \$1.25 million dam's

completion, the third major dam completed by the Authority.

EDUCATION
The Halton County Board of Education and the Authority last year operated a conservation education program for the students of Halton County.

This year the educational facility will be operated for four months on a trial basis at a cost of 50 cents per student, a reduction from last year's two dollar charge per student.
