Halton Lawyers Urged Submit Recess Opinions

Halton County lawyers are being urged by Mr. Justice Samuel H. S. Hughes to submit briefs to the Ontario Law Reform Commission.

Mr. Justice Hughes, who is presiding at the Fall Assizes of the Ontario Supreme Court which opened in Milton last week, spoke briefly at a dinner at the

Chamber of Commerce in Oakville.

He stressed the significance of the commission's work and indicated a wide variety of legal opinions will help it bring in the best recommendations possible. He has been voicing quiet oppo-

sition to the trend towards reducing the traditional long summer court vacations.

He said that for most judges as well as himself the long summer court recess is not a vacation but a period during which the jurists can "hone up" on the law. He

invited any lawyers who feel as he does regarding retention of the traditional summer procedure to make their feelings known.

FROM THE SHIP
"If I don't take that period during the summer to bring myself up to date," he said, "I feel as though I am shooting from the hip in passing judgments. I don't think any of you appreciate justice being shot from the hip."

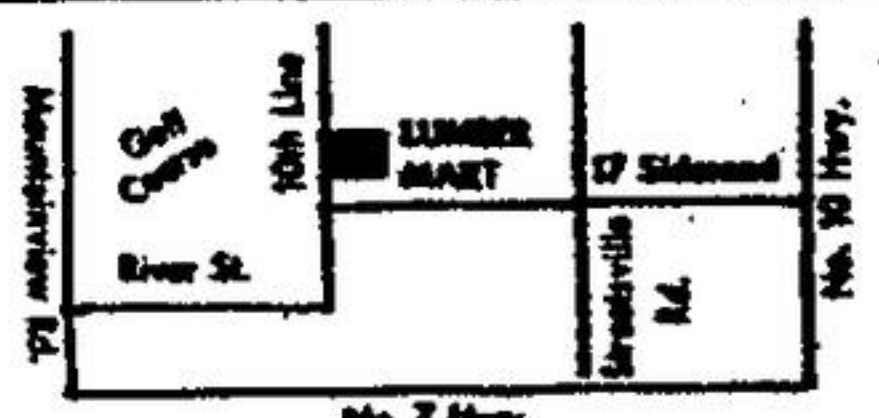
