Despite the many moods of weather throughout the growing season many excellent specimens were displayed. Interpretations of the arrangement classes were also well received. The Rug Hookers Guild of Georgetown added a colourful display of their work with demonstrations which created much interest during the afternoon and evening.

Miss Dorothy Stone, local artist painted one of the prize winning arrangements of the show. Completed works were also on display, two of which were arrangements from other shows painted on the spot.

The Society's refreshment committee headed by Mrs. W. C. Bradley and assisted by Mrs. Wm. Boyle provided another popular spot by serving refreshments during the show.

The downtown location, the extended hours and the day being Friday proved very popular. Many lingered for some time to reap the full impact of colour, arts and crafts of those who make it a part of life.

R. B. Pinkerton copped the most points in the show honours with Miss E. Jackson placing second. Miss E. Jackson was recipient of the Mrs. S. G. Bennett Trophy with her arrangement "The Scent of Apples". Frank Brown claimed the Canadian Rose Society Bronze Medal for the best rose in the show. Ben Case retained the Duffield Trophy for another year proving his chrysanthemums are the best.

Too Much Bureaucracy Says Bruce McLaughlin

"Are you aware that 50 percent of all the people who have ever lived are living today, and are you aware that 90 percent of all the scientists who have ever lived are living today?" S. Bruce McLaughlin, developer, told 393 honor students Wednesday night.

Mr. McLaughlin, president of McLaughlin Associates was the principle speaker at the third annual honors graduate banquet sponsored by the Peel board of education.

"Today there is too much competition, materialism, stress and bureaucracy in our society and too little public harmony," he said. "We've had this message in copious quantities from the youth, but they turn off older people when they complain."

"Let's say 100 percent of the people now know what the problems are," he said. "What do we do about them? All I ask youngsters is to give one thought-out suggestion if they feel something should be changed in the status quo."

"I do not believe we should change for the sake of change, but I do yearn for improvement," he added.

One area where Mr. McLaughlin would like to see change is in the growth of equal opportunity so "the lowest strata of society can filter up to the top."

He also wants greater choice in individual life styles.

EXCHANGE
"I suggest that part of the time a student is at university, and hopefully later in secondary schools he should go down to Quebec and enroll in schools there like some people send their children to Europe today," he said. "Also Quebec students should go to other parts of Canada and do the same."

He said this educational exchange would help to knit the country together.

Mr. McLaughlin believes the taxation system requires some fundamental changes.

"The change has something to do with choice," he said. "I believe people who prefer to live the simple life should be allowed to do so. I suggest that tax be totally removed from all basic

food, shelter, and clothing."

"Of course with this change in taxation you would have taken more some place else," he said.

"I believe we should take more from consumables in every other category since all taxation is basically toward the consumer."

CONDEMNED

Mr. McLaughlin said there has to be dramatic change in the land development industry because the present trend is towards sprawl and "sprawl is universally condemned."

He told the honor graduates that man is a "concrete of habit" and pointed out some habits to avoid.

"I suggest you do not get hooked on the interest wheel," he said. "Do not borrow unless it is a capital item which you wouldn't be able to afford for many years and then only when there is a savings element involved."
