Congratulations to all the girls and to coaches Andy Mandarino and Jim Cooper.

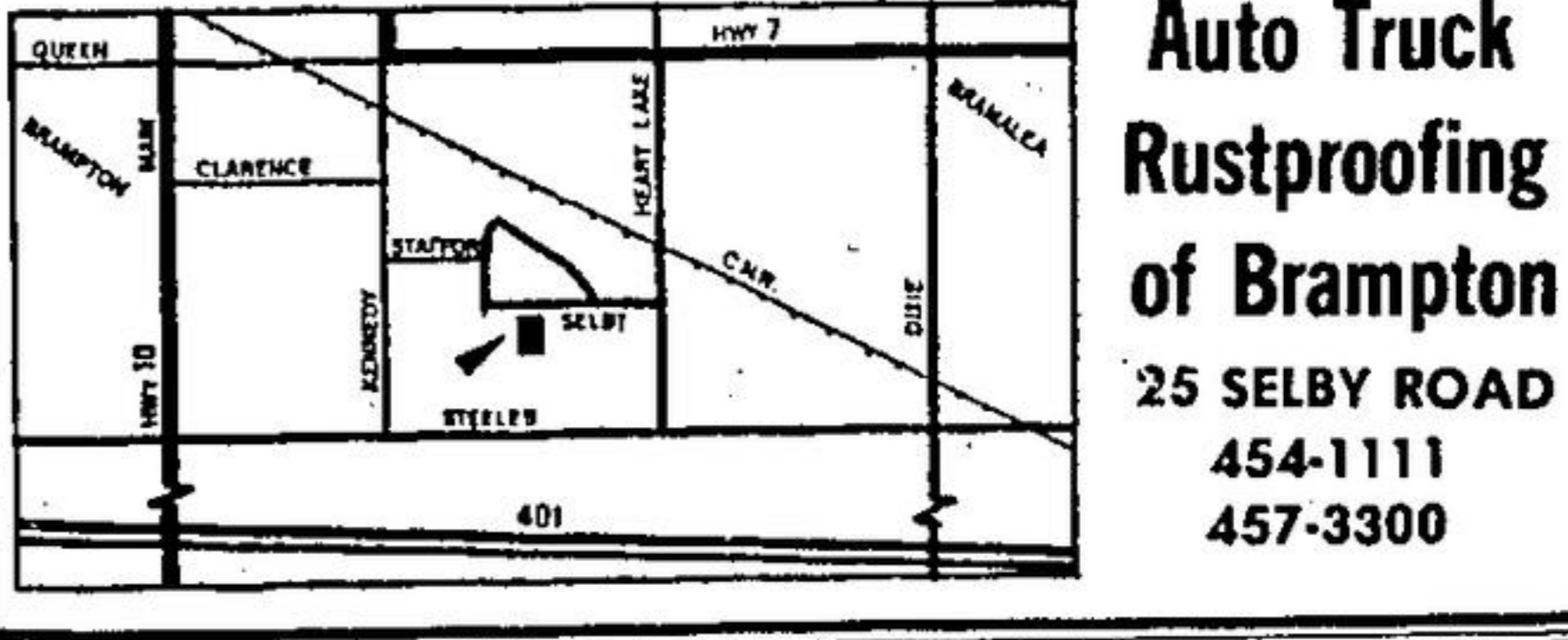
JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP
