The authentic pioneer furniture serves as the perfect setting for the Indian wood carvings, beaded leather work and Eskimo carvings and seal skin jackets.

There are many other handcrafted objects, leather pouches made by a man in Acton, children's hand crocheted sweaters, hand made pottery, crewel embroidered pillow cases, hand made toys, Quebec wood carvings, hand-made place mats, wall hangings, beewax candles with the smell of honey still on them, birch bark waste baskets, decoupage and very modern super ceramic jewellery and posters.

Dried weeds, flowers and even huge paper flowers stand among the displays, and they also are for sale.

Mrs. Harrington is known throughout the area for her work in re-upholstering chairs, which she has done for sometime.

NORTH HALTON REPORT

During the week ending September 11, officers of the Ontario Provincial Police stationed at North Halton Detachment worked a total of 927 1/2 hours and patrolled 9,452 miles on area roads under their jurisdiction. A total of 59 drivers were charged for traffic violations and an additional 49 received warnings. Proceedings held in Milton Provincial Court resulted in 114 convictions.

Officers were required to investigate 65 general occurrences during the 7 day reporting period. Included in this number were: 2 thefts, 2 break and enters, one assault, 2 persons were charged under the Liquor Control Act, one complaint of willful damage, one complaint of trespassing, one person was reported missing then later returned and one premise was found insecure by an officer on night patrol. The remaining occurrences were of a minor nature and required little investigative time to clear.

Two persons died this week as a result of injuries sustained in 2 motor vehicle collisions. Injuries

to 3 persons were received in two motor vehicle collisions, the remaining three resulted in property damage only. The total property damage was estimated to be approximately \$3,710.00. Causes of these collisions were attributed to: careless driving, and speed too fast. Three persons have been charged following investigations.

Zeal for Batiks Will Rub Off Onto Students

Batik and Tie-dye! Spark your interest? This art form certainly caught the eye of Mary Lou Brock. She is the programme chairman of Social and Educational programmes for the "Y". Mary Lou saw the demonstration of batik at the Rug Hooking and Hobby Show. Perhaps you saw it too.

Batik is the process of creating a design on material and painting with wax the areas not to be coloured. Then the piece is dyed and finally the wax is removed. This process is repeated two or three times for a simple design, perhaps as many as twenty or thirty times for a complicated design. Each time a different colour is used the area not to be coloured is protected with wax while the dying takes place.

TRICKS
As well as teaching this time-consuming process, the "Y" class will learn some of the tricks of tie-dye. Tie-dye uses the same idea but simplifies it considerably by omitting the waxing and using different methods of knotting or folding the material to create the pattern.

The instructor for this new "Y" course will be Jane Dams, a Terra Cotta artist. Jane has been working with oils for some time. She won the Canadian National Mural Award two years ago. She also won the 'art Award at Thistletown Collegiate and she has a painting hanging in that school. Jane discovered Batik about two years ago and her own enthusiasm for this art is bound to rub off on her students. She enjoys creating wall-hangings, but

the adaptability of batik is proven by her plans to do a skirt in velveteen. Her designs are simple abstract shapes, the colours bold.

SUPPLIED
The "Y" course will provide ten weeks of instruction, 2 1/2 hours each week. It will be held at Cedarvale Tuesday nights. Wax, dyes and brushes will be supplied. Each participant will be provided with a yard each of cotton and silk, the cotton for a first attempt, the silk for use once some skill has been attained. Jane will have some of her designs available; the really brave can make their own!

So come, learn this fascinating art. Make scarves, skirts, wall-hangings - your imagination is the only limit! Just in time for Christmas, too.
